

Permit For Fleet On River Is Asked

A harbinger of the improved water traffic facilities on the Co-lumbia river growing out of the installation of new deep water locks at Bonneville is seen in the application of the Inland Naviga-tion Water company for permis-sion to operate a fleet of boats and barges on the Columbia river between Portland and Dent Landing, east of Umatilla. The application will come up for hearing in Portland before a representative of the interstate commerce com-mission. Frank McCollech, Oregon utilities commissioner, has been made a party to the proceeding and will attend the hearing.

Railroad officials are opposing the granting of the application. saying the new line would be disastrons to rail traffic from the eastern Oregon country.

Under the proposal of the Inland Navigation company, the latter would be permitted to quote rail rates from eastern Montana and other northwest points, to Dent landing, and from there to quote rates to Portland on barges. Large quantities of grain from the inland empire would move over the new line, its sponsors anticipate.
