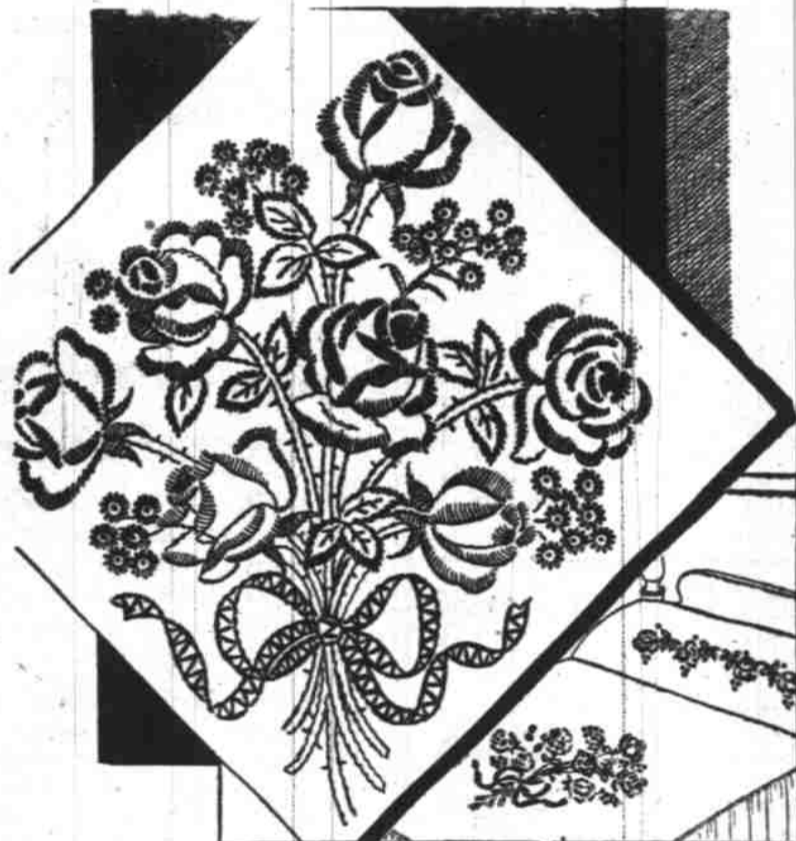

PWA Harmony Class is Progressing

One of the most interesting classes in the PWA series, now being conducted at Salem high school, is that in harmony and the fundamentals of music. Under the leadership of Dr. R. W. Hans Setz, a most able and gifted instructor and one with an extremely spacious musical background, a group of young men and women, brought together by a common love of music, have been making excellent progress.

Starting with the study of the construction of scales, intervals, etc., the study has progressed through the writing of harmonic exercises, up to the composition of original melodies. Also, some time has been devoted to the study of the construction, character and range of all the orchestral instruments. Great stress has been laid throughout the course on the development of the musical ear.

That the study of harmony is not a dull affair, as is popularly supposed, is attested by the fact that visitors to the class, with absolutely no knowledge of music, have been deeply interested.

Robert Rawson Owner of Collection

In connection with Music Week, it is an interesting fact that one of the largest private collections of music on the Pacific slope is owned by a young man in Salem, Robert Rawson, of 1310 South Liberty street.

This collection consists of 523 items, including the vocal scores of 117 operas, 33 other collections of music, vocal and instrumental, and 378 pieces of sheet music, both songs and piano pieces.

Perhaps the most salient feature of the collection is the large group of opera scores, especially the light-operas, consisting of works by Reginald DeKoven, Victor Herbert, Julian Edwards, Gustav Liders, Gilbert and Sullivan, and others.

Books and scores now permanently out of print are owned by Mr. Rawson. He possesses many of Victor Herbert's compositions, including the scores of 26 of his light operas.

Supplementing the collection, Mr. Rawson has a comprehensive library of Red Seal records.
