The following excerpt from a review in one of the Cincinnati dailies shows the progress being made by one of Salem's young musicians:

"The second soloist was a gifted young pianist from the class of Dr. Albino Gorno, whose father years ago was also a student at the college. He is Emery Hobson, who, as his performance of the second concerto of Rachmaninoff proceeded, revealed a surprising talent and brilliant virtuosity. The poetic beauty of the work was fully realized and the bravura passages were given with dynamic effect. Mr. Hobson not only showed a mastery of the keyboard, but also those musicianly qualities which must be the foundation of real pianism. Dr. Gorno conducted the orchestra and a triumphant result brought the evening's concert to a close."
