# Warn Advertiser On Mail Box Use

Advertisers and agents who allow their circulars to shove posters and other unmatted material into mail boxes are liable for postage on the material and may be subject to a federal fine, Arthur Gibbard, assistant postmaster said yesterday.

Postal regulations forbid use of the mail boxes to carry material which has not been sent through the regular mail channels, Gibbard explained. Violation of the rule has been found especially prevalent in rural boxes during route inspections now in progress.

Where the unpaid material is found by the inspectors it is brought to the postoffice and the sender advised to pay the postage which would have been paid had the matter been sent through regular delivery. In case violation continues, a fine may be added, Gibbard said.

# Red Cross Thanks For Flood Relief

# Funds For Phone Plan Transferred

The state board of control yesterday formally authorized the transfer of \$50,000 of federal funds from the allocation for a state telephone system to defraying the cost of the proposed short wave radio setup. The radio system would serve the state highway department, state police and state forestry division.

The transfer has been approved by C. C. Hockley, Oregon engineer for the federal public works administration.

Work on the radio project must begin not later than June 20 and be completed by December 20.

The board voted to hold the federal allocation for the proposed central state listening and power plant in obedience to the main radio station would be in Salem with eight other smaller plants scattered throughout the state.
