Rebecca S. Mount Dies at Silverton

Funeral Services For Aged Woman Will Be Held Thursday

SILVERTON, May 12.—Funeral services for Mrs. Rebecca Stevens Mount, 95, will be held Thursday morning at 10 o'clock on the old Mount home place on Liberty hall. Mrs. Mount, Silverton's oldest citizen, died suddenly Monday night at the home of her son, Dr. Guy Mount, in Oregon City, where she had gone several days ago for a visit.

The Mount reunion, annually, for nearly 40 years, has been held in or near Silverton and for years has honored especially the aged woman. Last year nearly 100 attended the reunion. She had lived in the same house here 30 years.

Rebecca Stevens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hansen Stevens, was born in Keokuk, Iowa, August 15, 1840. She crossed the plains with her parents in 1852, settling in the North Howell area. At the age of 16 years she was married to H. D. Mount, a 1900 Marion county pioneer, and who died here some years ago. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary prior to her death.

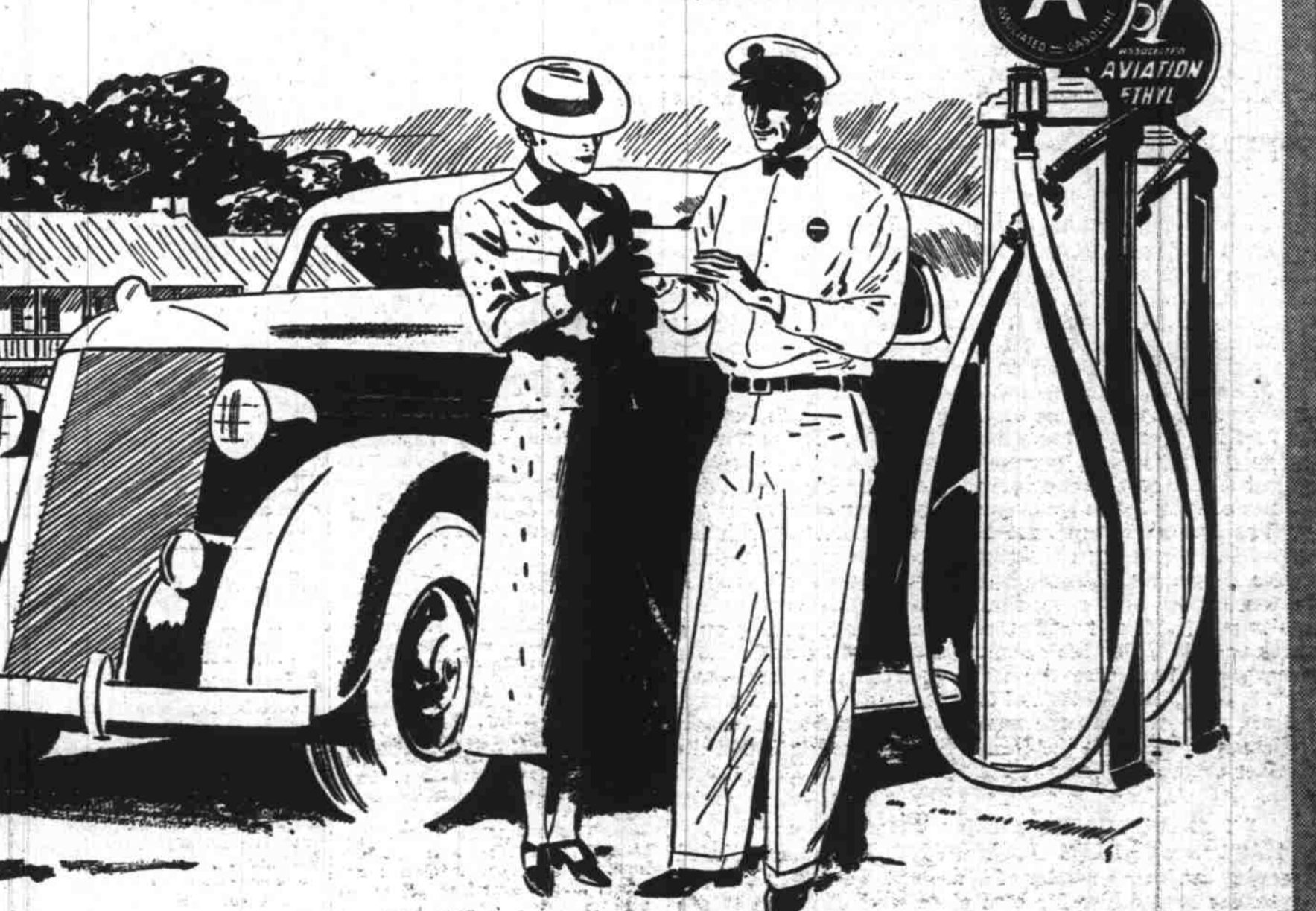
