## Ideas on Shower Parties Constitute Current Topic

SHOWER IDEAS are wanted at the Round Table this week. There is just a day and a half left to enter so don't delay.

Original ways to present shower gifts to the guest of honor are especially desired but any hints on how to conduct a successful shower party will be welcome. Anvair showers, stork or pre-nuptial parties all come into the category.

Following are birthday cake recipes received last week:

**Chocolate Cake**  
2 cups sifted cake flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 cup butter or other shortening  
1/4 cups brown sugar, firmly packed  
2 eggs, unbeaten  
3 squares unsweetened chocolate (melted)  
1 cup sweet milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Sift flour once, measure, add soda and sift three times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time and beat well. Add chocolate and beat well. Add flour alternately with milk, a little at a time. Add vanilla. Bake in two greased 9-inch or three 8-inch tins in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 25 to 30 minutes. Spread with following:  
Frosting  
2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar  
4 tablespoons hot water

1 egg white, unbeaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
dash of salt  
3 squares unsweetened chocolate (melted)  
Combine sugar and hot water. All egg white and beat until thoroughly mixed. Add remaining ingredients and beat until well blended. A favorite with men.

**Mince Meat Cake**  
1 cup shortening  
2 1/2 cups sugar  
1 1/2 cups mince meat  
1/2 cup milk  
4 cups flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoons pastry spice  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Cream shortening and sugar. Add egg yolks and beat well. Alternate with sifted dry ingredients, milk and mince meat. Fold whites, beaten stiff, in last. Put nut meats in when flour is added. Bake in loaf pan for one hour at 350 degrees. Thirty-five minutes baking time if in layer tins. This amount will make a 2 layer cake and 16 cup cakes. Roll up cakes in 1-minute frosting then in coconut for snowballs. These are nice for children's birthday parties. Keep moist.
