Morning Gains Are Wiped Out

Average Down .1 Point as Still Another Record Set on Few Sales

NEW YORK, May 12 .- (AP)-The stock market tried a feeble line buck today, but was thrown for a small loss.

Gains of fractions to 2 or more points were scored in the morning. Then the going became a little rougher and the afternoon performance was a slip-shod affair at the best. In the final hour most advances were cancelled or replaced with fractional declines.

It was a dragged session throughout. Total transfers of 599,020 shares were the smallest for a 5-hour day since June 7, last year. They compared with 677,750 Monday. The Associated Press average of 60 issues yielded .1 of a point at 58.5. Changes Varying
