

Local, County Races Viewed

Clean Tactics Aimed at Issues Mark Contest; No Personalities

The most-discussed political battle is that of the circuit judgeship with L. H. McMahan, incumbent, putting on a spirited personal fight for reelection. Walter E. Keyes has been in the field early and late for a month lining up votes and he has had strong support from attorneys and newspapers. William H. Trindle, who did not stand for reelection for district attorney, expressed confidence yesterday that he would be first or second in the race with a strongly organized bloc of votes behind him. The general sentiment is that the race is between McMahan and Keyes with the greatest McMahan strength showing in the rural districts.

The county has shown a very mild interest in the quest of its three residents—Charles L. McNary, Sam Brown and Theodore Nelson—for the republican nomination for United States senator. Senator McNary is considered a fixture at Washington, a senior senator of whom the county and the state are proud with the result that no one thinks the two opponents to the senator can make much of a dent in his vote. Sam Brown has been in the county very little since he started his campaign and presumably counts on the large vote he rolled up here in the race for the republican nomination for governor. He will find that vote greatly lessened, observers believe, when he comes against McNary as he does tomorrow.

Campaign Warm for Courthouse Offices

A hot race is on for several courthouse positions. Six men, all active, have been beating the bush for votes for sheriff with James McGilchrist claiming 100 workers in the precincts organizing to get votes for him. "Dick" Richardson and Charles J. Johnson have likewise sizeable organizations while S. A. Harris of Brooks has been combing the county for more than two months rounding up the votes of his friends for the sheriff's job. H. F. Field has been active in Salem; A. L. Tumbleton has likewise been on the firing line although neither of these men has attracted the newspaper attention that has come to the McGilchrist-Richardson race.

A strong movement to line up republican votes behind Lyle J. Page for district attorney was in progress last night in order to quench the political ambitions of Herman E. Lafky who has been fighting in his campaign for district attorney for months. C. S.

Emmons, popular Salem attorney, has picked up sizeable support. The anti-Lafky forces are fearful that Page and Emmons, both popular and capable, will divide their strength and let Lafky win. Page has the edge in the speculation on the outcome of tomorrow's vote because of his experience.

Friends of U. G. Boyer, county clerk, say he has nothing to fear in his race for re-election but William Bliven's persistent, unrelenting campaign for votes has Boyer nervous and at the last minute his friends are circulating the county in his behalf. Bliven expects the large number of ex-service men with whom he is acquainted and farm and business friends made over a 30-year period of residence in the county, to bring him victory.

No one talks about the state treasurer's race. Rufus C. Holman is a foregone nominee on the republican ticket. U. S. Burt will probably get the majority of democratic votes for the job in this county, largely because he is better known than Jack Allen, his opponent. No one knows or seems to care who obtains the democratic endorsement for the congressional district, or Carney or Kirkpatrick.

The public will go to the polls in a very calm frame of mind and with few strong emotions. There is no self-assured savior of the county or state on the ticket. Let the weather be hot and the vote will be light. The polls open at 8 a. m. and close as promptly as possible. The larger districts counting boards will be under way by 10 a. m.

10-Juror Verdict Legal Says Court

State High Tribunal Puts Approval on Conviction of John J. Osbourne

The state supreme court on Tuesday declared valid the constitutional provision that 10 jurors may return a verdict of guilty in criminal actions where capital punishment is not involved.

The opinion was written by Justice Kelly and affirmed the conviction of Joseph John Osbourne, now serving a life term in the state penitentiary for the murder of Simon Miah, Portland merchant, in December, 1934.

The trial was held in the Multnomah county circuit court with Judge James W. Crawford presiding.

Appeal to the supreme court was based on two alleged assignments of error.

The first presented the question whether the ballot title of the 10-juror constitutional amendment was such as to annul and invalidate the action of the electorate in approving it.

Attorneys for Osbourne alleged that the ballot title was grossly inaccurate, unfair, misleading and untrue.

Discriminatory Plea
The second assignment of error alleged that the constitution amendment abridges the privileges of those who are charged with or convicted of the crime of murder in the second degree, denies to them the equal protection of the laws and deprives them of their liberty without due process of law.

Justice Kelly held that under the amendment, as construed, there could be no discrimination. "Every person charged with any crime is and will continue to be treated in the same way, procedurally, as every other person charged with a similar crime," Justice Kelly continued.

Osbourne served as a special police officer in Portland prior to the slaying. In another opinion the court affirmed Judge Arlie Walker of Polk county in a damage action filed by Fred Landis against J. J. Wick. The lower court held for the plaintiff.

Landis alleged that he was injured when struck by an automobile driven by Wick.

Car-Truck Crash Is Fatal to Two

EUGENE, Ore., May 13—(AP)—A car-truck collision on the Siuslaw highway near Triangle lake west of Eugene cost the lives of two men late today.

B. J. Olsen, Seattle, and Donald C. Kearns, Portland, were killed when their automobile, collided with a logging truck driven by J. McDonald. McDonald was not seriously hurt.

Must Approve Claims
All claims against county funds, arising from fines and forfeitures in liquor cases, must receive the approval of the county courts, in addition to that of the district attorneys, Attorney General Van Winkle held Tuesday. The opinion was requested by Ben C. Flaxel, district attorney of Coos county.
