Poppies for Sale By Auxiliary Friday

TOMORROW will be Poppy day in Salem and throughout the United States. Nearly 100,000 women from the American Legion auxiliary will distribute the flowers and receive contributions for the welfare of the disabled veterans and families of the dead and disabled.

Observance of Poppy day here will be in charge of Mrs. William Taw. A large corps of volunteer workers from the unit is ready to begin distribution of the flowers on the streets early tomorrow morning.

No price will be asked for the poppies but each person allowed to contribute as much or as little as he feels able. All contributions will go to the support of the Legion and auxiliary welfare programs, with the bulk of the money remaining in the hands of Capital-Link for local work.

The poppies to be distributed here tomorrow have been made by disabled veterans at the Portland veterans' hospital. More than ten million poppies have been made for this year's observance.

Writer's Section Meets At Franklin Home

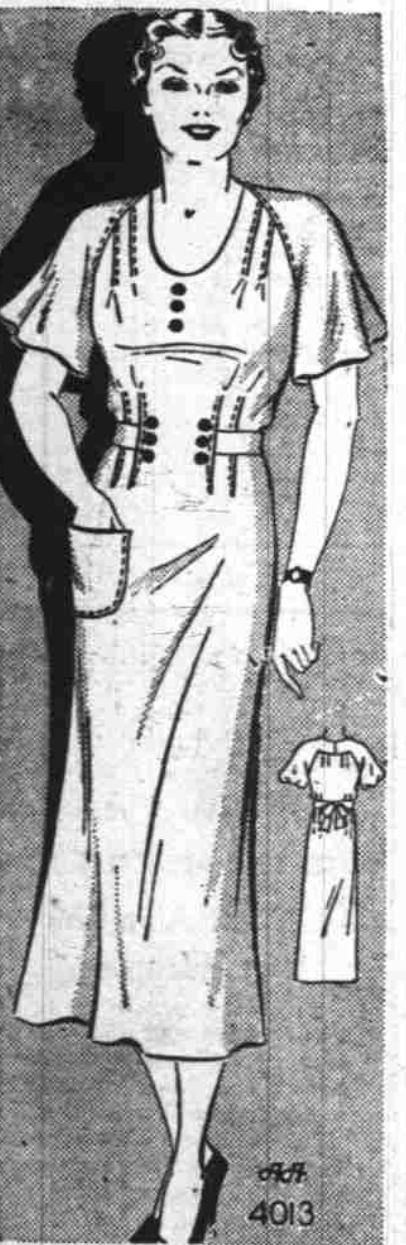
