Beauty Is Praised
The Elsinore has been called "the most artistically beautiful theatre in America." It is not large but it has grace of line and sublimity of color. The architecture is modified English Gothic.

George B. Guthrie built it in 1926. The two murals on the north and south walls of the foyer from "Macbeth" and "Romeo and Juliet," respectively, were painted by N. B. Zane of Eugene.

The name, Elsinore, is taken from Shakespeare's play, "Hamlet," in which he refers to the company of actors from the town of Elsinore, who were called the Elsinore players.

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Yakima's Water System Success

Unlike Stayton Proposal and It Doesn't Give Trouble, Learned

When the open joint pipeline in the Yakima underground filter failed to produce a sufficient volume of water because of the type of gravel in which it was laid, the water department resorted to dipping the water from the Naches river into two small collecting basins, the largest of which is approximately 35 by 70 feet, Koon said. An irrigation type of ditch also is used, running along the ground above the perforated underground pipe.

The water from the ditch is permitted to filter through rough stone rip-rap walls in the basins to the surrounding gravel and from there it flows into the open joint piping and on to the pipe line leading into the city, 10 miles away.

Silt Forms Behind Riprap, Explained
The silt complained of by ex-Mayor W. W. Stratton of Yakima in his letter to Pope actually collects behind the riprap in the basins rapidly and allowing the water in the surrounding gravel to backwash, Koon said he was told. He has found no indication a silt problem may arise on Stayton Island.

Photographs Koon took of the Yakima collecting basins shows them to be open, surrounded by brush and unprotected, a condition that will not exist on Stayton Island, where the water collecting system will be underground, he assures. A blueprint map of the Washington city's water intake system shows it to be parallel to a state highway, in distinct contrast to the isolation of Stayton Island.

"The unusual feature of the Yakima system is that to look at it you wouldn't think it would work, yet it does," Koon stated. "They get good water there, 10 second feet of it. That is all Salem needs."

Under orders from the city council Koon and his staff are going ahead with their planning of the Stayton Island intake and of the 17-mile gravity pipeline leading to Salem. The most favorable location for the pipeline is being mapped out in preparation for the securing of easements where the line can not be laid along a highway right of way. Cost of the easements is not expected to be great since the pipeline will not interfere with farming after it has been buried underground.
