prisoner, it would then be a matter for his discretion which could not be controlled by mandamus. Martin doesn't plan a hard-boiled policy.

The decision of Judge L. H. McNahan that good behavior alone would not permit the release of a prisoner from the state penitentiary at the expiration of his minimum term, will not result in a hard-boiled policy on the part of Governor Martin in handling the parole situation, he declared Monday after he learned of Judge McNahan's ruling in the Earl Fehl case.

"This office will give immediate attention to recommendations for paroles as rapidly as prisoners qualify for release," Governor Martin said.

"But it will require more than mere technical acquiescence to the letter of regulations to win favorable consideration."

The state parole board and Governor Martin will confer later this week regarding the parole situation.

ing and selling livestock at the Kansas City stockyards. In an unanimous opinion by Chief Justice Hughes the court said Secretary Wallace had not given the commission men an adequate hearing.

Another defeat for the government was recorded in a 6 to 3 ruling that the Elgin, Joliet and Eastern Railway company had not violated the interstate commerce act by carrying products of other United States steel subsidiaries.

The government won its contention that it was entitled to priority over Florida creditors in payment of claims against an insolvent surety company from a \$75,000 deposit required for doing business in that state.

It was also victorious in its attempt to keep from paying \$48,099 as its share to cover losses as the result of fire on the army transport "Logan" in 1918. The court said the suit was barred because the Atlantic Mutual Insurance company had waited too long to file it.

"Christianity in the Present Crisis" is the subject of a panel discussion at the fortnightly forum of the Marion County Farm-Labor association at the labor hall, northwest corner of Court and Commercial, at 8 p. m. Tuesday. Those already selected to compose the panel are Mrs. Lynn Wood, who has had extensive experience as an industrial secretary for the Y.W.C.A. in Michigan; Robert Grant of McMinnville, president of the Baptist Young People's union of Oregon; Rev. Dean Polndexter, pastor of Leslie Memorial M. E. church; and S. H. Van Trump, county horticulturist, and a prominent granger, who is affiliated with no religious organization. Mrs. Nathalie S. Panek, a member of the executive committee of the association, will preside.

The topic has been selected with a view to the conflict of opinion on the question at the general conference of the Methodist church at Columbus, and to similar controversies in other religious groups. Three viewpoints will be represented in the Tuesday night discussion: One, that Christianity should be applied to social problems; two, that the church is an obstruction to social progress; and three, that the church should avoid participation in social issues.

Six Persons Die In Airway Crash

AMOS, Quebec, May 25.—(P)—Six persons were killed in the crash of a General Airways plane near Chibougamau lake yesterday, it was learned tonight.

The victims include W. H. Clarke, pilot; Georges Millhan, mechanic, and four passengers. One of these, said information from Rouyn, Quebec, was Leo Springer, prominent Canadian mining man and head of Cere Explorations Limited.

Pilot Gath Edwards, sent out to search for the plane when it was unreported, discovered the wreckage about half a mile from Lake Chibougamau and about 100 miles from Amos.

Two of Gambling Cases Still Wait

Special Prosecutor Ralph Moody is expected to file his reply to the defense briefs, very shortly, according to information at the county clerk's office here.

It is probable that the plea in the bribery charge against Coffey will not be called for until Judge Latourette rules on the other demurrers filed in both cases.

12-Hallock Crate Okehed by White

Use of a special 12-hallock crate for shipment of raspberries during the 1936 season, was authorized Monday by Solon T. White, state agricultural director.

Request for the concession was made by the Gresham Berry Growers association.

This crate is one and fifteen-sixteenths inches in depth, 13 and three-fourths inches wide and 35 and one-eighth inches long, all inside measurements. Hallocks shall be four and one-half inches by four and one-half inches, outside measurements, and shall be not less than 16-16ths of an inch deep, inside measurement.

The hallocks shall be well filled and contain not less than 8 ounces of berries.

Tax Sale Bidders Notified of Liens

City Treasurer C. O. Rice yesterday sent notices to 13 persons who bid on \$4 parcels of city property at the county's recent tax foreclosure sale that the city would buy up these lots unless the bidders give the city assurance that street liens would be presented. In many instances, lots on the county lists bear from \$200 to \$500 in bonded street liens whereas less than \$150 in taxes stands against them.

A special city council committee appointed to act to save the city from loss of these liens through sale by the county has tentatively decided to arrange a deferred payment plan whereby bidders may pay the taxes to the county and then pay up the city assessments by installments.

Democrats Write In McNary's Name

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25.—(P)—Three hundred voters wrote in Senator Charles McNary's name on the ballot for the democratic nomination for United States senator, an official tabulation of the Multnomah election returns showed today.

McNary, a republican, will be opposed in the fall by Willis Mahoney, Klamath Falls. The Multnomah returns showed Mahoney with 18,395 and John A. Jeffrey, Portland, his opponent for the democratic nomination, with 15,689.

Cities Want Use Of State's Radio

Use by various Oregon municipalities of the proposed statewide short wave radio set up for the state police, state highway department, and forestry division, was urged upon Governor Martin Monday by Herman Kehrli, secretary of the League of Oregon Cities and a number of mayors.

Governor Martin said he was agreeable to the plan, provided it would not interfere with the operations of the state police. The operations by cities would be confined strictly to police work.

It was suggested that in return for this service the municipalities provide quarters for the radio stations and defray part of the cost of operations.

Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, said he had no objection to the proposal.

The proposed radio set-up includes 14 stations, the three largest of which will be located in Salem, Klamath Falls and La Grande.
