

Protracted Task of Canvassing Marion County Vote is Ended

Most District Races Settled

Three Constable Contests and One For Justice Need Fall Vote

Official count on votes cast in the primaries was completed late yesterday afternoon, County Clerk U. G. Boyer announced, with last reports on the justice of the peace and constable nominations in the seven districts in Marion county.

The count shows contests to come before the voters in November in only the Salem, Silverton and Woodburn districts.

Mr. Allison is a partner with his brother, James Edward Allison. Their firm designed the new group of buildings for the University of California at Los Angeles, one of the noteworthy architectural developments in southern California. Other structures they have designed are high school groups at Palo Alto and Santa Monica, buildings for the University club, Friday Morning club, Shakespeare club and Woman's Athletic club in Los Angeles and the Southern California Edison building.

Allison is a native of Hookstown, Penn., born May 14, 1881. He took a course in architecture in the University of Pennsylvania, studied at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris, 1908-9. He began his practice in Pittsburgh and in 1910 removed to Los Angeles. He was division representative of the American Red Cross with the American armies in France in the war. He is a fellow of the American Institute of Architects.

MacNaughton Qualified; Started as Engineer
E. B. MacNaughton is president of the First National Bank of Portland. He is a native of Cambridge, Mass., a graduate in engineering of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He began work as a construction engineer in 1902; was a member of engineering and architectural firms in Portland; member of property management firm; treasurer of Strong and MacNaughton Trust company of Portland; since 1928 connected with the First National bank organization.

MacNaughton is president of the board of trustees of Reed college, and of Portland Library association; a trustee-director of Portland Electric Power company and is identified with many other Portland enterprises.

Mrs. Gordon Voorhies is a native of Portland and was educated in the public schools of that city. She has traveled extensively in this country and abroad and has long been interested in art and architecture. Her husband is a retired army officer and they make their home on an orchard tract near Medford.

T. H. Banfield was born in Portland and educated in the public schools of that city. He was long engaged in the building and contracting business. In recent years he has served as president of the Iron Fireman Manufacturing company.

Cannery Work Here Started

Hot Weather Puts Season Under Way; Damage to Berries Is Feared

Following an experimental run of gooseberries yesterday, officials of the Reid, Murdoch & Company cannery announced last night that they would continue packing the berries, even though they are a little green.

Need for the packing of the berries was found when growers became fearful that the sudden hot weather would develop mildew and burn following the cool rains of last week.

The hot weather also caused local canneries to jump into the packing of Marshall strawberries sooner than was expected. Hot weather suddenly ripened the berries, causing a flood on the retail market, and necessitating the packing of the fruit.

One Plant Starts
Reid Murdoch got underway on the Marshalls Monday night, with Hunt Brothers, Paul's and Starr Fruit products expected to be taking the berries today. Practically all the crop is reported to have been contracted at prices of 4 1/2 to 5 cents.

Scarcity of pickers is being noticed by most of the growers. Another possible trouble appeared last night when the skies clouded up with an evident threat of rain. Some damage to the berries and considerable inconvenience would result to the growers should the rain be prolonged.

Utility District Vote Is Planned

The electors of Marion and Linn counties, in addition to candidates and initiative measures, will vote on the creation of people's utility districts at the November election, it was announced Tuesday.

If approved, the districts will select an organization and authorize a bond issue for the development and distribution of electric energy.

The state hydroelectric commission recently completed the reports on the matter of rural electrification in these counties with the statement that at the present time the establishment of competing power lines would be hazardous.

Loan Association Session Is Today

Stockholders of the Marion-Polk Farm Loan association will hear E. M. Ehrhardt, president of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, outline the policies of the Farm credit system at a meeting of the association to be held at the chamber of commerce at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon. The meeting is open to the public and Willard S. Bartlett, secretary of the local association, has invited anyone interested to attend.

Stockholders in the four local associations, the Marion-Polk, Dalles, Horticulture and Stayton have an investment of \$118,000 in capital stock of the lending organization. Loans of \$2,500,000 have been made to farmers in the territory through its offices.

Following an explanation by Ehrhardt of the present effort of this administration to decentralize the management of the land bank system and to place responsibility for loans with local associations, a round table discussion will be held upon problems facing the stockholders of the loan group.

Simplicity Note Marks Wallulah

Willamette University's 1936 yearbook, the Wallulah, is off the press and will be ready for distribution June 4. The Wallulah this year is striking in its simplicity of make-up and design, borders being entirely dispensed with and ornamentation held to a minimum.

The book, with 192 pages, is printed in transparent blue and black, with the body in Garmond and the large type in Sans Serif. The cover is a blue slightly darker than the transparent blue used in the art on the section pages and sparingly in some of the type. The bleeding edge is used for practically every picture in the book. On the front pages, with foreword, dedication and other introduction, the type is set in inverted pyramid style.

Modern, But Grecian in General Lines; Long Plane Emphasized

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More Spacious Than Previous Capitol
Broad stairways lead to left and right from the rotunda to the second floor, which places the senate chamber on the east and the house of representatives on the west. Back of each chamber are offices and committee rooms for the legislature. The office of the governor is on the south side of the building, between the two chambers.

A third floor is provided, with galleries about the senate and house chambers and the remaining space for legislative committee rooms. In the basement a cafeteria, a barber shop, press room and storage rooms are provided.

Several rooms are marked "unassigned"; and the floor plans will be subject to revision after conference between the architect and the capitol commission.

All quarters are much more spacious and modern than the old capitol provided.

Parole Is Again Refused by Feh

Earl H. Feh, ex-county judge, serving a four year term for bail theft, Tuesday for the second time refused to accept a parole cointing upon his remaining out of Jackson county.

"I don't need any parole," Feh said. "I have already served my time."

Circuit Judge McMahon on Monday denied a petition of habeas corpus seeking Feh's release.

McMahon held that Feh would be required to serve out his maximum term unless paroled by the governor.

Feh alleged that he had served his maximum term under the Oregon indeterminate sentence law and was subject to immediate release.

It was reported Tuesday that a handful of convicts made some disturbance at the prison Monday night in protest of the ruling of Judge McMahon on the parole case, although neither Feh nor any of the other 30 men whose cases await disposition, participated in the noise-making.

Garbage Damages Upheld in Ruling

Garbage fumes are damaging, the Oregon supreme court ruled Tuesday.

Plaintiffs in a suit against the city of Portland for injuries resulting from the dumping of garbage into a ravine near their property were upheld in the collection of \$240 damages in an opinion written by Justice Harry Belt on an appeal by the City of Portland defendant.

The complainants were Samuel V. Wilson and his wife, Maggie Wilson, who alleged loss of rental of three houses owned by them because of odor from the garbage.

"Poisonous, offensive smells, fumes and odors polluted the atmosphere near and upon their premises rendering the same uninhabitable," the plaintiffs alleged. The city held that the fumes were "somewhat offensive," but denied they were poisonous, or that they polluted the atmosphere to interfere with the residents.

The circuit court presided over by Judge James W. Crawford, sitting without a jury entered the judgment which was affirmed by the supreme court.

Mrs. Combs remained in charge of the women's protective division tonight.

Report Is Filed On Foreclosure

Sheriff Burk yesterday reported to the county clerk sale of real estate in the first case known in this section of the state in which the Frazier-Lemke act was invoked, but without success. The foreclosure suit, that of Grace White against Flora Peterson, was halted May 5 in a restraining order May 5 by Conciliator Seymour Jones, but May 20 Federal Judge McNary of Portland issued an order vacating Jones' order, which allowed the scheduled sale on foreclosure to proceed, and at the sheriff's sale the plaintiff was high bidder with \$3,475.55.
