T. H. Banfield declared that while Gould's work had been highly satisfactory, he favored employment of an Oregon architect for this work should the job of technical adviser be continued.

"There are architects in Oregon just as competent as Gould," Banfield said.

Robert W. Sawyer of Bend said he could see no reason for the employment of one architect to check another.

"It is my opinion that a consultant architect and adviser would prove valuable," Dr. H. H. Olinger of Salem said. "We have no personal acquaintanceship with the New York architects and the time might arrive when we would need advice. I agree with Mr. Lake."

Gould indicated that he would continue to serve as technical adviser should his services be required.

Hopes were expressed that the Trowbridge and Livingston firm, which is one of the largest in the country, would be able to push forward rapidly the completion of the plans and specifications so that contractors' bids could be called for in the early fall. The condition of the award is completion of the plans by September 15.

Repair Of Filter Beds Is Started

The city water department yesterday finished the task of ferrying more than 400 cubic yards of sand and gravel to Minto island where the material is being used in rebuilding the two filter beds. Manager Cuyler VanPatten reported. The first of the two beds to be reconstructed can be put into service at once if the demand for water rises, he said, but probably will not be connected up until next week. Meanwhile it will be washed to settle the new material and clean out silt.

The second bed will be ready for use next week.

VanPatten said the beds would be ready for summer use this season at what he believed to be the earliest date on record.
