Father Meier Will Present Degrees, Assisted by Rev. Koppert

MT. ANGEL, May 29 — Mt. Angel college will graduate a class of 31 students, May 31. Graduation exercises will be held at St. Mary's auditorium at 2 p.m.

Out of this number, eight will receive their bachelor of arts degree and the other 23 their junior college certificates. Judge John P. Kavanaugh of Portland, a member of the first graduating class of Mt. Angel college, will give the address to the graduates.

Ralph Schwab of Mt. Angel will be salutatorian and Willie Whalen of Portland, valedictorian.

To Present Degrees

Right Rev. Abbot Thomas Meier, O. S. B., president of the entire institution, will present the degrees and diplomas and Father Vincent Koppert, O. S. B., rector, will assist. After the diplomas have been distributed, the oratory medal and the general excellence medals in both the academic and collegiate departments will be awarded.

The preparatory department of Mt. Angel college will be represented by 26 graduates from academic work.

Musical melodies will be played by the college orchestra under the baton of Alexander Scharbach. The popular college quartet has been augmented by four other voices.

Van Zandt Talk, Dramatic Sketch Featured; Post Here Has Meeting

Emanating from Washington, D. C., as special 30-minute Memorial day program will be broadcast over the network of the National Broadcasting company today under the sponsorship of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States. Time of the broadcast can be ascertained from the radio programs published in this morning's papers.

Commander-in-Chief James E. Van Zandt of the V.F.W. will deliver a brief address, but the feature will be a special Memorial day dramatic sketch produced in the studios of the NBC. Special patriotic music for the occasion will be provided by the University Chanters, a mixed chorus composed of students of the University of Minnesota School of Music, broadcasting from Minneapolis.

Honored guests of Marion Post 661 of Salem, at the regular meeting included John Snellstrom, junior vice-commander of the department of Oregon, of Eugene; Major William G. White, adjutant, and Clint Chism, service officer, of Eugene Post 293. Vice-Commander Snellstrom reviewed the records of the organization within the state during the past year, evidencing a rapid increase in membership and interest, and the Eugene visitors told of the activities of their local organization, boasting an active membership of nearly 300.

Marion Post will participate in the Memorial day parade and services today in a body and Post commander Russell Mudd, assisted by the color bearers and color guard will raise the colors on the court house lawn following the parade. Marion Post, as has been the custom for many years, will conduct the memorial services at the Turner cemetery this morning, returning in time for the parade at 1:30.
