

First View of Site Is Taken

Confirms First Opinions on Suitable Design Keally Asserts

made with the chamber of commerce. The affair is wholly informal, with no set program.

Interesting facts of the plan were revealed by Messrs. Keally, Jacoby and Sanders, which could not be explained on the competition drawings. With reference to the State street side, two small entrances are provided at the junction of the south wing with the main structure. Taking advantage of a slight difference in elevation, the area in front of the building as it faces State street will be depressed, which will give full natural light in the south half of the basement, making it usable for general offices.

An elliptical driveway will come in from State street. In the center of the ellipse, fronting State street and Willamette university, the statue of the Oregon Pioneer will be placed. This will develop the south front of the building, both to provide entrances and to make it imposing and attractive. Part of the area may be devoted to parking space, sunk below the general level.

Special emphasis will be put on the ornamentation of the building, said Mr. Keally.

"We handled this problem differently from many other plans. Instead of waiting until the building was completed and then looking around for places suitable for decoration we called in very able sculptors and painters and obtained their suggestions and cooperation, so the outside of the building and the decoration plan were developed together. You may notice the sculptured figures shown on the drawings. They were not just roughed in, but the careful work of the sculptors, two of whom have won the famous award of the Prix de Rome. We want the sculpture and the painting to harmonize with the building and with Oregon."

The great seal of the state will be put in the wall over the main entrance.

Both Keally and Jacoby emphasized the point that the design was not an adaptation from previous architectural patterns. "We sought to make this an Oregon capitol, and not one out of a copybook. While it retains the simple lines of the Greek architecture, it does not use the Greek details at all, but is strictly modern. We studied Oregon history and tried to catch the spirit of the state and of its past and to express that in the building design."

"As we drove up Summer street into the capitol tract," said Keally, "it seemed to me that the design we had dreamed just fitted into the setting; and that no other design would. We are highly pleased with the location, and think it can be developed, with future expansion to the north as we have indicated, into a very beautiful capitol group."

Seemed Only Design

Minor changes may be made in the floor plans, said the architects, but none is contemplated in the exterior lines of the building. "We made many designs for the Oregon capitol," they said, "but always came back to this one as the one best suited for the site, the design we had dreamed just fitted into the setting; and that no other design would. We are highly pleased with the location, and think it can be developed, with future expansion to the north as we have indicated, into a very beautiful capitol group."

On the discoveries of Pasteur and Koch the modern bacteriologist builds for the prevention of disease by discovering the virus and identifying it. Plague, typhus, rabies, spotted fever, are diseases which call for scientific work for detection, he pointed out.

Small Staff Has Limits, stated

Dr. Douglas of the county department of health reported that the present staff, much smaller than it was several years ago, is handling a larger volume of work in tuberculosis, venereal disease control, and in school inspection; but is unable to keep up the former rating in maternity, infant, and pre-school care.

LOS ANGELES, June 1.—(AP)—Dr. F. E. Townsend is considering going to jail as a gesture of defiance in his struggle with the Bell congressional committee, probing the Townsend old age pension movement, Sheridan Downey, counsel for the Townsend organization, said on his arrival here today.

"Dr. Townsend alone will decide, but I believe he is strongly inclined to refuse to post bond when he is indicated in the next few days for contempt of the committee," the lawyer asserted.

Mystery Appears In Drowning Case

OREGON CITY, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—Disappearance of \$20 supposedly in the wallet of Louis Peterson, 56, Portland, who drowned in the Clackamas river early this morning, injected mystery into what at first appeared an accidental occurrence.

Peterson, with friends, went to the cabin of Pat Murphy on the river Saturday night where a party was held. During the party Peterson either walked or fell into the river. His body was recovered almost immediately.

The transfer company for which he drove paid him off Friday night. His wallet was missing when the body was recovered. Sergeants Moore and Snow of the state police said.

Claims Disputed In Divorce Case

Eugene M. Howe, against whom complaint for divorce was filed recently by Lucille B. Howe, has filed answer and counter affidavit in which he claims the couple were living together as man and wife on the date on which she alleges desertion and that they have been separated only 11 months.

In the affidavit he states further that he is not an experienced mechanic as she claims, but a common laborer, and that after he was driven from the family home he went to Longview and prepared a home for her and their child there and tried to induce her to join him. He says she now has a comfortable home with her father in Astoria, and that he is able to furnish her a home if she will not return to her husband. Wash.) called the attention of the republican senators to statements made by Landon before he was prominently mentioned in the presidential race—favorable to the administration's relief efforts.

The Oregon senators divided on this bill, McNary voting for it and Steiwer against.

Here are the major provisions of the deficiency bill outside of the \$1,425,000,000 for relief:

Authorization for Secretary of public work administration to use \$300,000,000 of its revolving fund for grants, estimated to permit a new public works program of up to \$800,000,000. Appropriations for a number of other agencies including \$308,000,000 for the civilian conservation corps; \$458,000,000 for administration of the social security act; \$41,100,000 for the Tennessee Valley Authority; \$40,000,000 for the post office department; flood control, etc., \$128,250,000, and rural rehabilitation and farmer relief \$85,500,000.

College Grants 3 Honorary Degrees

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 1.—(AP)—Three prominent leaders of science in commercial and government fields and 35 students received degrees today at the sixty-seventh annual commencement at Oregon State college.

High officials of the state's educational and governmental system participated in the traditional outdoor academic procession and the graduation exercises where Dr. Stratton D. Brooks, former president of the University of Missouri, addressed the students.

Three honorary degrees of Doctor of Science were conferred on U. N. Gabrielson, successor to J. N. "Big" Darling, as head of the United States Bureau of Biological Survey; R. K. Brodie, Cincinnati, director of manufacture and technical research for the Proctor and Gamble company; and J. A. Hanson, internationally known poultry breeder of Corvallis.

Start Vote Today To Settle Strike

PORTLAND, June 1.—(AP)—A strike settlement agreement upon which more than 10,000 union loggers and sawmill workers will begin voting tomorrow calls for an independent hiring hall, printed copies circulated tonight revealed.

Charles H. Gram, Oregon labor commissioner who had led negotiations, will have supervision over the hall to be established in Portland.

The members will vote either "yes" or "no" to a 14-point working agreement devised after three weeks of negotiation by representatives of the Columbia Basin Loggers' association, which is the organization of employers, and the Columbia river district council of lumber and sawmill workers' unions.

C. C. Carlson, Portland, will hold a hearing in the civil service rooms of the federal building at 10 o'clock this morning to determine the minimum scale of wages to be paid for work on the new postoffice.

Carlson was designated as referee for the hearing by the secretary of labor. Union representatives and others interested are expected to attend.

The minimum scale will be set by Carlson on what he determines to be the average wage now being paid for the different types of work in and around Salem.

New Deal Critic Takes Good Lead

DES MOINES, Ia., June 2.—(Tuesday)—(AP)—Sen. Lester J. Dickinson's lead in the Iowa republican senatorial primary slipped a little early today as additional unofficial returns rolled in, but the new deal critic still was well in front.

Gov. Clyde L. Herring held his lead over Congressman Hubert J. Utterback in the democratic senatorial primary race.

In 480 of the state's 2,442 precincts, Dickinson amassed a vote of 23,110 to 13,473 for Smith W. Brookhart, former senator but his percentage slipped from 40.3 to 37 per cent of the total vote.
