

Agreement Reached on Most Points for Loganberry Standard

Size of Berry Only Question

Canners Suggest Minimum But Growers Point to Impracticability

Only one point of disagreement developed between canners and growers on grade requirements of Loganberries at a public hearing conducted yesterday at the chamber of commerce rooms by Frank McKennon of the state department of agriculture. The hearing was on the adoption of grades and standards for the canning berries.

The hearing was attended by 60 growers and by representatives of only one cannery. The only objection raised by the packers to the proposed grading was that no requirement for length of the berries was made.

The grade suggested by the Oregon Loganberry Control board, inc., as presented at the meeting by William J. Linfoot, secretary of the board was:

"Loganberries are to be clean, fresh, firm, well-colored, well-developed, and not over-ripe, and are to be free from hulls, mold and decay, and from damage caused by dirt, or other foreign matter, shriveling, sun-scald, water, insects, mechanical or other means."

Representatives of the California Packing company asked that a requirement for length of the berries be included. Growers maintained it was "out of the question" to include such a standard.

Packing men indicated that they would like to have the requirement set at one inch. A possibility of compromise on three-fourths of an inch was suggested by some of the producers. All present agreed that the grading of the berry crop would tend to improve the quality of production.
