seems designed and executed with special reference to neatness without extravagance. It has 165 rooms, and each and all of them contain water, gas and a telephone, which cannot be said of any other hotel on the Pacific coast. Water closets are on every floor, with a constant supply of clear, cold water from top to bottom of the house, and everything carried away by a great sewer, deep under the building. It is a credit to the capital, and will do much to add to her influence in Oregon.

"Mr. C. A. Cutting is the manager for the building company, and gives evidence of understanding the art of keeping a hotel."

Community Project; Many Owned Stock. The construction of the hotel was a community enterprise; nearly all Salem citizens who were able took stock. The building originally had a mansard roof. When it was largely rebuilt, and became the Marion, the mansard roof became the fourth floor. Soon thereafter the dining room used by service clubs and other groups, was added.

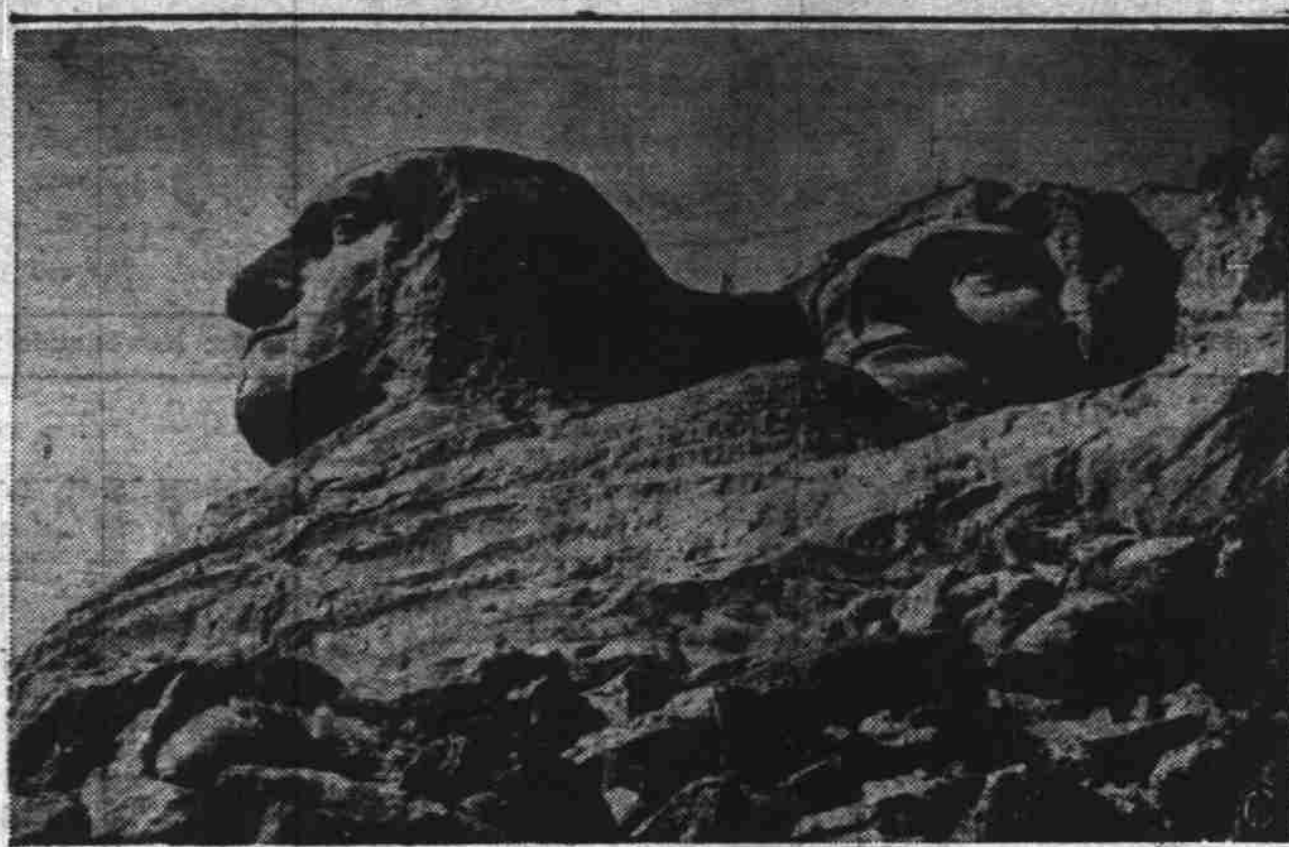

Renew Work on Huge Memorial in Black Hills



Return of favorable weather marked renewal of work on one of the most ambitious sculptural projects in history, the huge Mount Rushmore national memorial in South Dakota's Black Hills. Some conception of the size of the mountain figures is given by the above photo which shows the profile of George Washington at the left, his nose measuring 24 feet in length, face 60 feet from crown to chin, and the entire monument towering 240 feet in height. The rough outline of Thomas Jefferson, at the right, is the second of the four monumental figures, the third and fourth to be Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt. Gutson Bergum, famous sculptor, is supervising the work.

Sacasa to Resign Nicaragua Office

Farm Bureau to Draft Its Plank

CHICAGO, June 4.—(P)—The farm organization which claims percentage of the new deal's soil conservation act—the American farm bureau federation—began tonight to draw the farm plank it will try to build into the republican and democratic platforms.

Word that it will be a "definite and specific platform" came from the headquarters of Federation President Edward A. O'Neal. "It will be outlined in such a way that no one will be able to misunderstand it," a spokesman declared.

Early Bonneville Action Is Sought

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(P)—Brigadier General George B. Pillsbury, assistant chief of army engineers, told the house rivers and harbors committee today immediate enactment of the Bonneville power bill would be "decidedly in public interest."

Earlier today the senate commerce committee reported favorably on a companion bill after ordering revisions, mostly of a minor nature.

A major change ordered by the senate committee was elimination of a section under which the states of Washington and Oregon would each receive 18 1/2 per cent of surplus revenues from the sale of Bonneville power.

The house committee heard Representative Raymond S. McCough of Chicago, Ill., challenge the wisdom of hasty action on the Bonneville power problem.

He contended the "effect of the broad rate-fixing powers given to the federal power commission by the bill" should receive careful consideration. "The house and senate bills would authorize the power commission to control basic rates for all federal power projects."

Funeral Is Held For Arnold Hall

FRANKLIN, Ind., June 4.—(P)—Final rites were held here today for Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, 54, former president of the University of Oregon. He died Monday at Washington, D. C., where he was director of the Brookings institute's bureau of government research.

Services were held at the First Baptist church, in charge of Dr. Robert H. Kent of Franklin college, from which Dr. Hall was graduated in 1904. Burial was in Greenlawn cemetery. Dr. Hall was born in Franklin in 1881.

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age of labor for harvesting fruit and other crops.

"There probably will not be much WPA labor available for new projects during the summer," he said. "We will shut down projects where the men and women are needed for seasonal work. These shutdowns, however, will be only for short periods and the workers laid off WPA projects will retain their standing on our payrolls and be called back to the projects as soon as the harvests in their neighborhoods are over."

The Salem, Silverton and Woodburn sewing projects, which employ approximately 200 women, will be extended past July 1 if new money for their operation becomes available. S. W. Richardson, district projects supervisor, reported. He is planning to request an allocation of money sufficient to keep the sewing rooms open for another year, aside from periods during which cannery and other women's jobs may be had. Permanent Works To Get Preference

Latest information is that the new program will favor permanent construction, such as of building and recreational facilities, and permanent road improvements. Ordinary maintenance work will not be approved if other projects can be obtained, Bartlett indicated.

The WPA hereafter will demand estimates, specifications and plans as complete as though the work were to be contracted to private operators, in application for projects.

"This will make it possible for our engineers to pass on applications with more accuracy and speed than heretofore," Bartlett said. "We are now re-arranging our setup to enable our engineers to do more engineering and less errand-running."

Planning Provision Benefits Stressed. Bartlett averred the requirement for complete, accurate plans in new project applications would benefit the applicants whether or not WPA approval was received. The application material, he explained, may be filed away and be used, without additional engineering work, when the project is undertaken without federal help.

Yesterday's conference group, consisting of district and sub-district officials, was addressed by Ivan E. Oakes, state supervisor of WPA operations, and W. I. Hargis, director of safety. Oakes indicated projects in this district had for the most part been of a permanent nature. Hargis urged care for the safety of the WPA laborers. District three, local officials said, has had no serious accidents.

Prune Control to Go Ahead, Decided

**1600 Acres in County Are
Represented in Group;
Meeting Held Here**

Definite assurance was given to 65 prune growers who attended the producers' meeting at the chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon that organization of the new voluntary prune control association would be completed. No date for the election of officers was set.

The Oregon Prune control board met yesterday morning to check signatures to association papers. Though no announcement of the number of growers signed or the acreage represented was made the board determined to complete the organization.

It was estimated that 1600 acres of prunes in Marion county have been placed under the control of the new group. Additional signatures were obtained at the meeting yesterday. Another meeting was held at Newberg last night.

Packers Absent; Reported Opposed. The control board which was organized under the state AAA determined to set up a voluntary organization after the state law was declared unconstitutional, to control prices and acreage.

No packers attended the meeting yesterday but it is understood that they oppose the action of the Oregon board, unless similar associations are organized in California and Washington.

The new prune control board would consist of seven members, representing all prune growing districts in the state. Under the new plan the grower would keep control of his prunes and sell direct to any buyer, for deducting a small charge for association carrying costs. The board would have authority to fix minimum prices and also would keep constantly in touch with market and crop conditions and other matters of interest to the growers.

Members may revoke a minimum price by a vote of 50 per cent or more of the membership. Growers signing up agree to remain with the association during 1936 and 1937, but may withdraw during April of any year following.
