

# Is Topic of Bent

Advisable, Ad Club Speaker Asserts

The Indian youth would benefit more by attending public schools instead of Indian boarding schools in the opinion of George Bent who discussed legislation which has that end in view, and other problems relating to Indian education. before the Salem Ad club yesterday noon. Bent, with the Indian service for more than three decades, spent several years as boys' adviser at Chemawa.

Tracing the history of Indian education, Bent gave statistics to show how in recent years, as result of legislation, Indian attendance at public schools has gained while the number in boarding schools has been reduced.

"The boarding school should be used for the homeless Indian youth," Bent declared. "Only when he is educated with white children can the Indian youth hope to achieve success as measured by the white man's standards." Instances of successful careers of Indians of Oklahoma's five "civilized" tribes were cited to support his contention.

Government leniency in appropriating funds and lands to the Indian has been a harmful influence, Bent believes. He pointed out, however, that legislation designed to correct evils arising from this policy is already in
