

Jefferson Wins Argument With PWA on Water System There

Rates Won't Be Increased

Supply Will Be Taken From Wells Instead of Santiam

JEFFERSON, June 6. — The city won its argument with PWA authorities over the matter of raising water rates in Jefferson, and word was received from headquarters that the city could proceed with the new water system as planned without raising rates.

Early in May, the city council received a request from PWA officials to raise the water rate from \$1 for 3000 gallons to \$1 for 2000 gallons and 50 cents for each additional thousand gallons. At this time, the council decided that before raising the water rates in Jefferson, they would not accept the aid of PWA funds.

Word has been received from the city attorney, John Heitzel of Salem to have the bonds printed, they to be purchased by the government.

The contract for the reconstruction of the city water system was awarded in April to the West Coast Construction company of Seattle, whose low bid was \$13,184.50.

The reconstruction work will include the laying of new water pipes of creosoted wood dipped in tar, and relining the city reservoir. The water supply will be taken from wells instead of the Santiam river. Work on this project will start in a short time.

"Super-Traction" Line Is Expanded

Increased demand from truck owners has caused an expansion of the line of Super-Traction truck tires by the B. F. Goodrich company, three new high pressure sizes having just been added according to an announcement from principal offices in Akron, Ohio, received by W. H. Zosel, manager of the Goodrich-Silvertown store at 198 South Commercial street.

The three added sizes are 30 x 5, eight ply; 32 x 6 eight ply and 32 x 6 heavy duty 10 ply. The first two take 75 pounds of air pressure, the latter 80 pounds.

Since introduction of the Super-Traction type of truck tire, with a deeper tread of greater gripping power, designed mainly for off-pavement use, the popularity of this type tire for truck operations has consistently increased. Goodrich feels the addition of the three new sizes should again widen the range for the use of this tire.

Gaston Man Held, Burglary Charges

City police yesterday arrested Alvin Charles Davis, who said he lived at Gaston, on a charge of burglarizing the apartment of E. A. Ligan at 152 South Church street. Slump in Lumber Orders Reported

SEATTLE, Wash., June 6. — (AP) — A slump in new orders—blamed to the Memorial day holiday—was noted by the West Coast Lumbermen's association today in its weekly business reports from 200 down and operating mills in Washington and Oregon. Orders last week totalled \$8,150,793 board feet against 109,266,160 the week before.

Production aggregated 11,976,129, as compared with 115,031,473 board feet the previous week, and shipments totalled 104,079,401 against 103,856,553 the week before. The unfilled order file May 30 stood at 419,080,911 board feet against 440,064,945 the week before.

Unusual Bidding Ends Sale Soon

Unusual bidding under an unusual foreclosure decree brought a sheriff's sale to an end quickly yesterday afternoon. The case was John Heitzel, as trustee, against James W. Anderson and others. The property involved was 270 acres of the Anderson donation land claim about 12 miles south of Salem.

In the court order for sale, provision was made that the property be sold in three parcels until the judgment had been met. When the first parcel was put up, the plaintiff made a bid of \$800 which was immediately raised by Ruth Sather to \$2021, enough to pay the costs of the judgment. The mortgage was declared satisfied, the sale closed and the remaining two parcels of land were released from the judgment.

Mrs. Keene Won't Run, School Post

Next week's Salem school election field appeared certain to be a four-man race when Mrs. Roy S. Keene, former director, decided yesterday not to permit her name to be placed on the ballot. Many citizens had been urging Mrs. Keene to run for the office again.

Mrs. Keene explained that she did not feel she could spend the time which she felt a position on the school board demanded.

Petitions nominating W. F. Neptune for the board are expected to be filed Monday, the closing day, at the school clerk's office. Other candidates are T. B. Bradfield and Walter B. Miner, the latter two seeking reelection for their second terms.

All residents of the school district who are qualified to vote in other elections are eligible to vote at the school election at the administration building, 434 North High street, Monday, June 15. Taxpayers is not a qualification in a directorship election.

Summer School Opens Monday

Registration at Oregon Normal Will Be Tomorrow; Quarter Begins

MONMOUTH, June 6. — Registration day for the summer session at Oregon Normal school will be Monday, June 8. At this time students may enroll for the special two weeks' course, or for the six weeks' session, or for the entire quarter, which makes the seventh term required by the state legislature as necessary for graduation if the student enrolled after September, 1935.

Offerings during the two-week session include courses in diagnostic and remedial teaching in the intermediate grades; recent developments in primary education; debatable procedures in elementary education; comparative education; puppet show; crafts; and current trends in children's books.

During the seventh quarter which may be divided into two six-week periods, the following courses will be given: British prose of the 19th century, composition, modern social problems, world problems in political geography, applied mental hygiene, principles of teaching, and technique of teaching physical education.

President J. A. Churchill will head the teaching staff of 25 members for the summer sessions. The new health and physical education building will be used during the summer.

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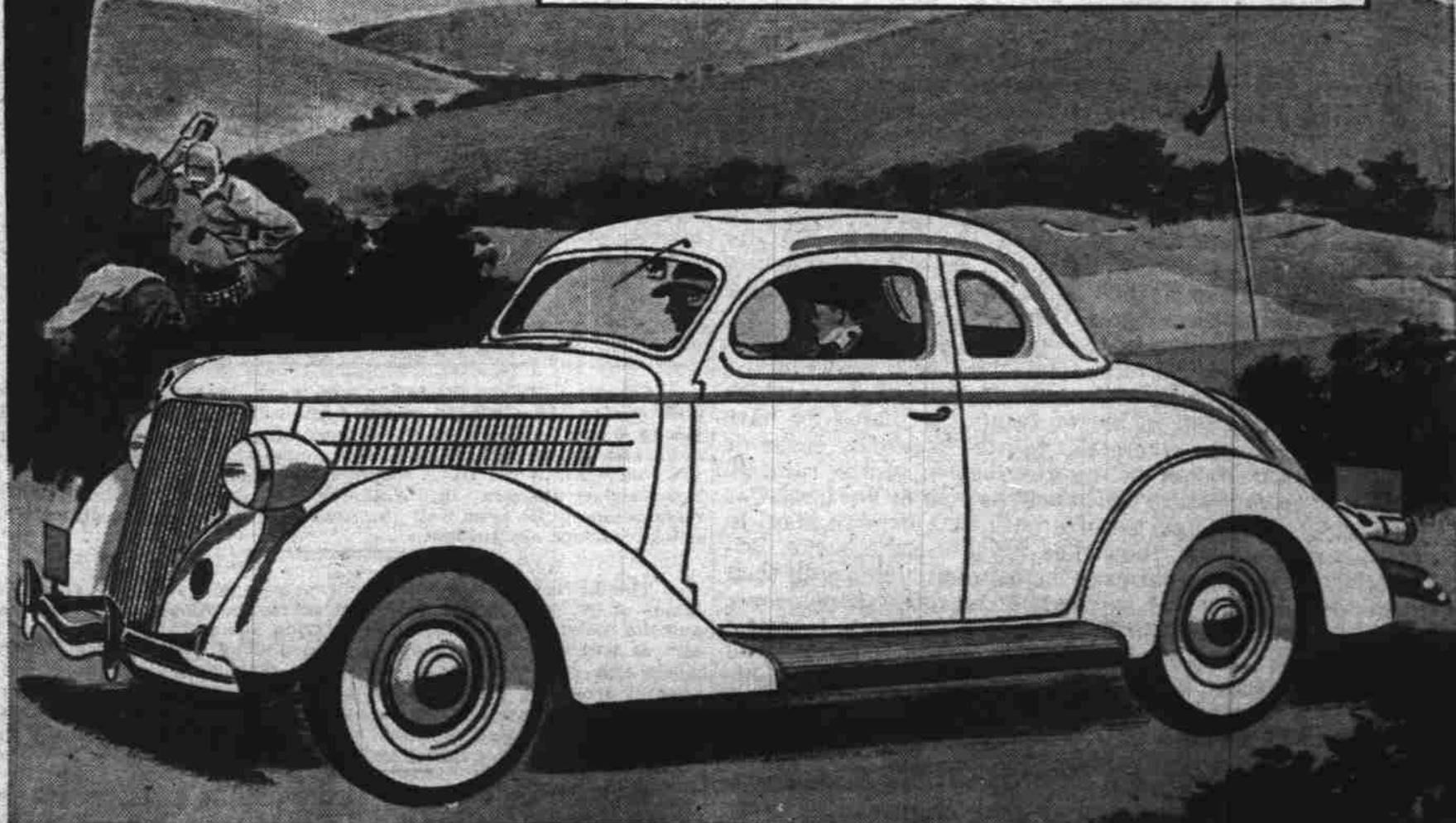
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
