Jones Estate Is in Probate

Total Value \$228,303 Is Reported; Some Bequests to Be Distributed

Appraisal of the estate of the late T. B. Jones was filed in probate court yesterday showing a total value of the estate of \$228,303. Of this \$185,474 was personal property and \$102,828 real estate. Roy Burton, J. E. Smith and David S. Adolph were the appraisers.

An order allowing partial distribution of the estate gives specific bequests of \$1500 each to Silas Ray Jones, Alta Lucinda Vlesko, Bert L. Jones and Pearl Gould. Distribution of personal effects of the deceased was also permitted. The order shows that indebtedness against the estate will not exceed \$5000.

The appraisal shows \$10,020 in bank accounts. Two Wallowa farms are valued at \$7820 and \$9300. Marion county farms are estimated at \$5478 and \$34,500. Newkown property is set down for \$1500. Lot 1, block 60 property is given a valuation of \$12,000 and lot 2 in the same block was set at \$18,000.

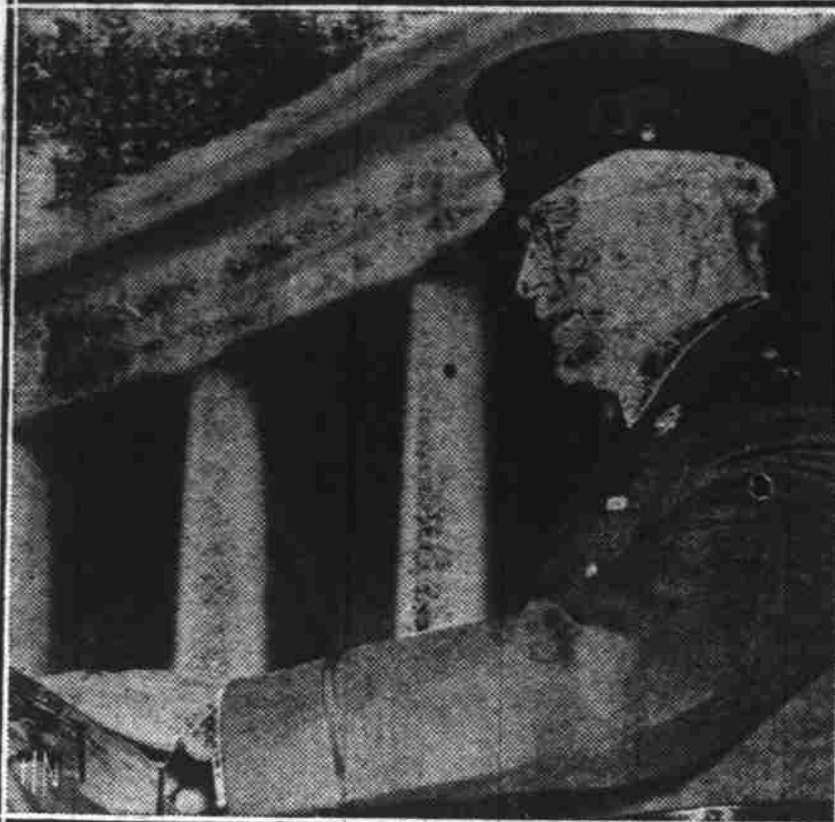

automobiles and clothes or other tangible necessary property.

2. A smaller class will retain the bonds or a portion of them as an investment to receive 3 per cent interest until the money is needed.

3. A small percentage will "live high" for a few weeks, spend the money on frivolities and at the end of a month or two wonder where the bonus has gone.

With the second half of the bonus about to be received, it is interesting to note how the first half was spent. To the payment of debts 31 per cent was applied. Nineteen per cent went to the improvement of homes.

Purchases Took Large Percentage

Next in order came the purchase of real estate, both city and farm property, then purchases of furniture. Clothing took a sizeable amount. But even before the purchase of furniture will come the present day necessities.

The automobile which will get its full share of the funds.

Veteran officials estimate that not more than 20 per cent of the funds will be kept for an investment. How much will be thrown away is incapable of estimate.

How much of the bonus funds have already been spent in anticipation of the payment is a matter of conjecture. It is known that loan companies have been active in caring for such loans. Cars have been sold on the basis of the bonus payment and credit has been expanded with the receipt from the government in sight.

So in effect, if the bonus payment is to cause a business boom, it has to some extent already been in effect.

Special Advertising Campaigns Planned

In some eastern cities merchants are said to be planning special advertising campaigns directed toward getting a portion of the veterans' money. In other places, business men's groups have formed on such lines.

In Oregon, no concerted campaign is anticipated. The principal reason for the lack of direct entreaties is the refusal of veterans' organizations to release their membership lists. But even with no direct action, each merchant and business man is hoping that some of the funds will come his way.

Predictions have been made by experienced managers that the bonus payment will cause a real summer boom which will be sufficient in volume to at least dissipate the regular summer slump.

Others, looking at the experience of the first payment, say it is doubtful if the boom will be much more than a flash and that within a few days business will level off on an even keel.

Mary Minter Case Reported Settled

LOS ANGELES, June 7.—(Sun.)—The Los Angeles Examiner said today that the \$750,000 civil suit involving Mary Minter, former film actress and her mother, Mrs. Charlotte Shelby, was settled out of court yesterday in an agreement reached between them and Blyth & Company, brokerage firm.

Although no signed agreements, no exchange of money had yet entered into the proceedings, the Examiner said, the brokerage company agreed to pay Miss Minter and her mother between \$100,000 and \$125,000.

Nine Are Killed, Oklahoma Storm

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 6.—(AP)—Nine persons were killed, dozens of homes and business buildings wrecked and widespread suffering caused by a 48-hour series of Oklahoma and Kansas tornadoes, rainstorms and floods that apparently were ended tonight.

Freight twisters whipped into isolated Oklahoma communities, taking five lives. Two Kansas and one Oklahoma farmer were killed by lightning. Another Oklahoma farmer slipped into a rain-filled pit and was drowned.

Twelve patients missed injury today when a twister ripped the roof from a Waurika, Okla., hospital and then thumped it back down, broken.

Nurses, seeing the approaching storm, carried two of the patients to safety from the top floor just before the black cloud hit the city, snapping tree trunks and damaging homes.

Another windstorm struck savagely at Hastings today, killing a farmer's wife, overturning three business buildings and wrecking a number of homes.

Schwartzkopf Is Out, Police Head

TRENTON, N. J., June 6.—(AP)—The man who directed the world-wide search for the Lindbergh baby killer prepared tonight to turn in his uniform and end his 15-year career as superintendent of New Jersey state police.

Criticized by Gov. Harold G. Hoffman for what he termed "police bungling" of the Lindbergh kidnap-murder investigation, but praised by Col. Charles A. Lindbergh himself, Col. H. Norman Schwartzkopf, refused appointment, goes out of office tomorrow.

Named by the governor to succeed him, Col. Mark O. Kimberling, the prison warden who had charge of the execution of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the Lindbergh crime, awaits state senate confirmation. The senate next meets on June 15. Meanwhile the state police will be directed by Maj. Charles H. Schoeffel, deputy superintendent.

Grange Convention to Get Some Attention

While the big tent for the week will be at Cleveland, Oregonians should spare one eye for the little tent that will open at Lebanon tomorrow, the state grange convention. The grange mixes politics with its agriculture; and its resolutions committee is sure to define the political program the grange will seek to put into effect.

No. 1 on the list will be public ownership of power lines, through endorsement of another grange power bill to establish machinery for state ownership, and of the public utility districts which are to be voted on in counties in the valley this fall. No. 2 will be a state bank, which has long been a hobby of Peter Zimmerman, member of the grange executive committee. The grange is expected to endorse abolition of compulsory military training at state institutions. It may urge a change to make the public utility commissioner elective instead of appointive.
