Two hard-hitting, scrappy, undefeated clubs will fight it out for top perch in the State league today on Olinger field at 2:30 o'clock.

The two clubs are Salem and Toledo, both twice winners in league games and both out with the old pepper for that State league championship.

Both hold their victories over Eugene and Albany. Salem beat Eugene 13 to 3 and Toledo won 8 to 6 over a patched-up Towne club, but Toledo beat Albany 7 to 3 and Salem went 13 innings before beating the Aloos 8 to 7 last Sunday.

Bevens to Chuck
Upon the mound, as it will be generally, the game will be a contest of agile youth against smart and tricky age. Bill Bevins, youthful hurler only one year out of high school, will pitch for the Senators while the veteran Ted Pillette, former Coast leaguer, will start for Toledo.

Bevens pitched a two-hit game against Blizz-Weinhard last Saturday. "Frisco" Edwards' slugging and well-balanced club will be up against an equally aggressive nine in today's contest. The Toledo team, listing several outstanding semi-pro stars, is tough on pitchers. Foremost among the Toledo hitters are Hoover, fence-busting left fielder; Hauser, catcher; and McClain, third base.

Against Eugene last Sunday the Lions battled out 12 safe hits, including several extra base blows.

Jim Carlin, Portland university hurler, will be in reserve for Toledo mound duty while Jerry Gastineau and "Squeak" Wilson will be on the bench for the Senators.

Woodburn Travels
Don Burch is scheduled to start for Woodburn in its contest with Bend, also undefeated, across the mountains today. Burch relieved Gemmell last week after Hop Gold took an early lead and held the boys to one hit in six innings.

Eugene, now at full strength after injections of Oregon varsity players, will meet Albany in a contest for possession of the cellar at Albany. Hop Gold, which will play here next week, draws a bye.

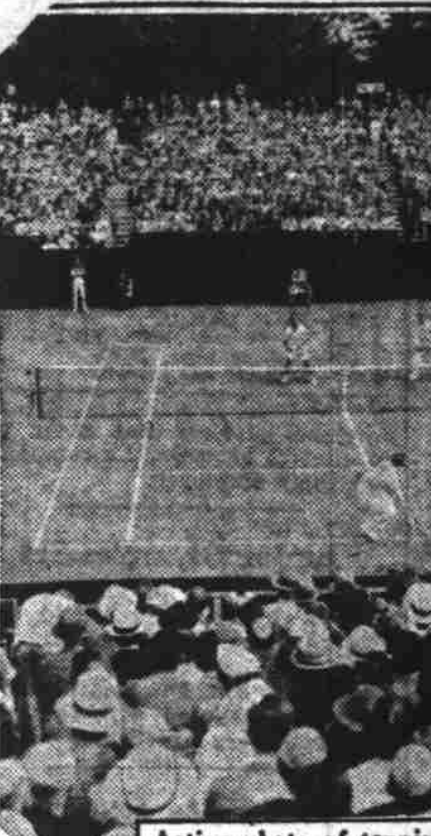

Beats Cooper, 2-Shot Margin

Phenomenal 282 Is U. S. and World Mark For Top Tournaments

BALUTSROL GOLF CLUB, Springfield, N. J., June 6.—(P)—Blasting all open championship records to bits in a heart-throbbing finish, dapper little Tony Manero, 31-year-old Italian-American professional, shot the greatest round of the tournament today to snatch the American open crown from "Lighthorse Harry" Cooper, the hard-luck man of golf, by a two-shot margin.

Four strokes back of Cooper, starting the final round, Manero came from behind to capture the greatest scoring derby ever witnessed in a national title tournament. He ripped two strokes off the Baltusrol course record with a closing 67, five under par, finished four shots under the former American record with a 72-hole total of 282, and made it a world mark by bettering by a stroke the best previous performance made in a British open championship.

Born and raised in the little town of Elmford, N. Y., just north of New York City and a product of the caddy ranks, Manero represented the Sedgfield Country club of Greensboro, N. C., in sweeping to the most spectacular victory since Gene Sarazen scored his second title victory four years ago.

Finish Two-Handed
After two days of the closest kind of competition, with the lead changing hands with great rapidity, the finish was strictly a two-horse affair as both Manero and Cooper finished well under the scoring record that Chick Evans set at 286 in 1916 and Gene Sarazen equalled in 1932.

Third place went to the Bloomfield, N. J., bomber, Clarence Clark, a co-leader in the opening round, who finished with 74-71 today for a total of 287. The veteran MacDonald Smith, of Glendale, Calif., as competitor for more than a quarter century, shot final rounds of 72-70 for 283 and fourth place. Trailing at 289 each were Ky Laffoon of Chicago, Wiffy Cox of Washington, D. C., and Henry Picard of Hershey, Pa., the pre-tournament favorite.

Where only one man broke 300 at Oakland a year ago, when Parks won with 299 exactly 44 of the 76 players participating in

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the final 36 holes were successful in scoring 299 or better for the championship route.
