

Oregon Solon Outlines Plan

Sound Governmental and Business Principles Needed, Declared

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upon the aims of republicans, he said:

"We propose to carry forward the lamp of American progress. The lamp which has been dimmed by the depression and which the new deal has tried to extinguish. We propose to show those who have waited for more than three long years for a real job how that job is to be obtained. We propose to show further to those who have jobs how their jobs can be protected against the ravages of the collapse which is inevitable under the new deal.

"The ten million unemployed shall at last get the consideration which they deserve and with it the privilege of honest work. They must be permitted to work again as free men and not languish as vote-slaves, nor as slaves of the dole.

"We propose to show the forty million now in gainful employment that economic freedom depends upon adherence to a system under which their pay envelopes will be paid and under which their life insurance policies and savings bank deposits will be protected.

"The keynote listed the following nine-point system he said must be put in force 'if we are to recover from the new deal':

"(1) Our government must provide an honest money and banking system which will permit the free and uninterrupted exchange of wealth and will not be subject to the sinister control of any group.

"(2) Our government is a vast business enterprise, but it is not run as a business.

"(3) Foreign trade may create either an asset or a liability. If we import goods which could be made or grown at home, we deprive American workers or farmers of the opportunity to earn livelihoods, and break down the American standards of living and thus compel a dependence upon foreign sources of supply.

"(4) Agriculture's prosperity is fundamental to the prosperity of the nation and farm income must be kept in balance with industrial income.

"(5) Ours is an economy of profit and loss. It cannot thrive without both. Law or regulation to guard against the losses inevitable in competition freezes industry and prevents progress.

"(6) Governmental representation of business works to destroy business.

"(7) A dollar primarily belongs to the man who earns it. Taxation is a seizure of purchasing power from the hands of its owner.

"(8) Under the American system, it is the business of government to govern according to the will of the people as expressed in the laws. No one can excuse the bureaucrats' use of taxpayers' money to write laws and to buy propaganda in order to force these same laws on the people.

"(9) Our nation owes to our people the duty to take advantage of our fortunate geographical position and to avoid all foreign entanglements."

Picketing Action In Highest Court

Application for a writ of mandamus, requiring the Multnomah county circuit court to exact from George B. Wallace & company, Portland, a bond, protecting automobile mechanics local 1005, against any damages, costs and attorney's fees, was presented to the state supreme court Tuesday by B. A. Green, Portland attorney.

The George B. Wallace company originally sought an order enjoining the union from picketing its property, and the request was granted.

Green later moved to have the temporary injunction dissolved on the ground that the bond was not sufficient. This was denied by the court.

The bond now asked by Green was said to be specifically provided for in the 1933 statutes.

Members of the supreme court conferred for more than an hour Tuesday afternoon, but indicated that a decision would not be forthcoming before late today.

The conference dealt exclusively with whether the court desires to take jurisdiction in the proceeding.

Under Surface, Still in Conflict Over Leader, Platform Issues

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travagance," brought applause. He cautioned republicans against "defeatist talk of our enemies."

He was given a minute-long ovation when he finished.

Thrice, before he even neared the end of his speech, the husky, 52-year-old Oregon senator brought the convention delegates to their feet.

First, when he made indirect reference to former President Hoover, and slashed at President Roosevelt, the delegates rose, making the floor a sea of waving hats swept by a wind of cheers. The debacle in March, 1933, he said, was marked when "a president-elect without a conscience refused for four months to cooperate with a president who had a conscience."

Again, when he asserted that next January "an oath-keeping republican president" will be inaugurated, and again when he hit out at "the false economics" under which young men have been "compelled" to "exchange their American opportunity, to which they are entitled, for enrollment in a federal camp at \$30 a month."

Will Continue to Defend Liberties

The heavy-set Oregon senator concluded with these words:

"Americans can boast that heretofore, following every depression, our people have found the impetus to reorganize for greater attainment."

"And now I ask the simple question—will America live or die? And I answer that America will live, because the people are firmly resolved that our nation shall not die."

"The full measure and depth of a great people's will is unknown, even to ourselves. The secret lies hidden in the omnipotent mind of the creator of all courage and all resolution. To him let our prayers be offered that an aroused America, casting out all doubt, will vindicate the faith of the faithful. We shall not falter, but in new found strength which will hold high, the banner of the nation's liberties."

Tariff Board Men Obtain Data Here

To get data for the federal tariff commission, O. A. Juvé and W. C. Funk, statisticians on the commission, yesterday interviewed canners, packers and growers of cherries, walnuts and filberts at the chamber of commerce.

In the afternoon a survey of the territory was made with Ed B. Shinn of the Cherry Growers' association accompanying the men. Similar interviews will be held in Dundee today.

The commission representatives conducted the interviews individually with the cherry and walnut men. They are seeking information relative to costs of processing to be submitted to the tariff commission for consideration in either raising or lowering import restrictions.

It was rumored that an attack on the protective tariff on the small cherries which are brined locally for maraschino purposes was in progress. Packers declare that should the present rate of 5 1/2 cents a pound on unspiced and 9 1/2 cents on spiced cherry imports be reduced it would be fatal to the local operators.

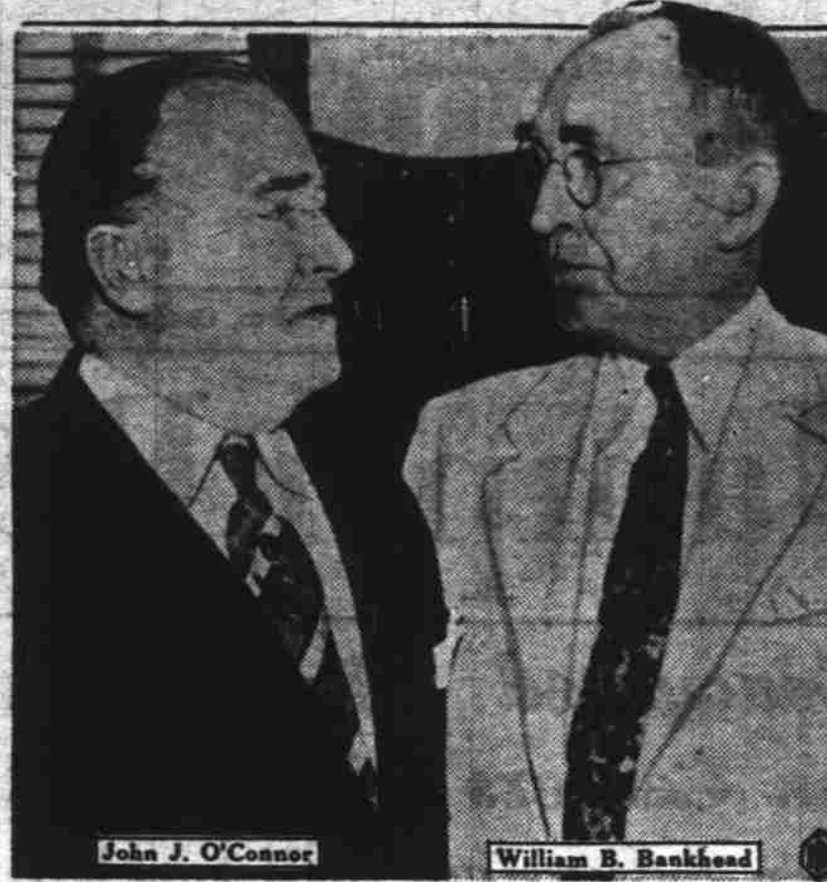

Adult education classes will continue on the present Monday, Wednesday and Thursday night schedule up to June 30, officials in charge here announce. If sufficient number register part of the classes will continue through the summer.

City Is Obligated To Protect Public

St. Helens Drowning Case Remanded; Old Quarry Scene of Fatality

In cases where property serves a city in a corporate capacity, it is the duty of the city to exercise the same care in providing safeguards as would be expected of a private owner.

This was held by the state supreme court which Tuesday reversed Circuit Judge Howard K. Zimmerman of Columbia county in a suit for damages filed by Ralph A. Wheeler, administrator of the estate of Danny Wheeler, 4, against the city of St. Helens. The lower court held for the defendant municipality.

Under the opinion written by Justice Rossman the case is remanded for retrial.

Plaintiffs allege that Danny Wheeler was drowned April 28, 1935, when he fell into an unprotected hole in an abandoned rock quarry on Plymouth street. Negligence in not providing proper safeguards was alleged.

Demurrer at Issue

The principal issue in the appeal was whether the circuit court erred when it sustained a demurrer based on the contention that the complaint did not state a cause of action.

"We cannot say that the defendants exercised due care in permitting this water-filled quarry to remain unguarded, and allowing children, in the meantime to come there for play," Justice Rossman wrote.

"They owed no duty to convert it into a street or a public playground, but it was their duty to exercise due care to render the place reasonably safe, or else exclude the children from it."

"If this parcel of land was serving a public or governmental purpose, the city would not be liable to the plaintiff for the boy's death, even though, with its knowledge, children constantly played there."

Drawing Line Difficult

The opinion said it was difficult to draw distinctly the line of demarcation between governmental and corporate powers.

Celery Shipment North Is Started

Celery shipments are being made to Portland and Seattle, Ronald Jones, grower in the La-bish section, reported yesterday. Eastern shipments will get under way in about 10 days, Jones said, when the harvest becomes heavier.

Prices for the celery are now exceedingly low, opening at \$1.50 a crate in contrast to the \$2.50 to \$3 received in previous years.

An excess acreage in California is given for the cause of the break in prices. Growers there are now selling at from 50 cents to a dollar as against \$2.50 received last year.
