

Summer School Classes Open for Independence Training School

117 Register First Morning

Preschool Age Youngsters in Special Group For Session

INDEPENDENCE, June 9.—The six week summer school session at the training school opened Tuesday morning, June 9, with 117 children registering the first day. More students are expected before the end of the week.

The summer sessions have proved favorable to parents and students during recent years and many pupils profit by this opportunity to keep up on subjects. Classes have been made as interesting as possible and a great deal of recreation has been provided for the children attending.

Offer Recreations
This summer the recreations offered are: instruction in swimming, archery, tap dancing, tennis and croquet.

A special class for youngsters of preschool age, from four to six years old, has been planned. Beginning lessons in school work and organized play will be given these tiny tots. There were 23 enrolled on Tuesday.

The sessions are confined to the mornings, the cost being assumed by the Oregon Normal school, that their teachers may have summer training.

Thomas Simpson Dies in Portland

ZENA, June 9.—An old pioneer of Oregon, Thomas K. Simpson died Sunday at a Vancouver hospital where his son Judge George Simpson had taken him several weeks ago after he had a severe sickness while living alone on his farm here. Mr. Simpson was 82 years old and came of pioneer stock, his parents being among the early settlers of Salem.

His death was something of a shock as he was feeling fine Sunday evening at 7 o'clock when his son visited him but at 9 was unconscious and never recovered. He underwent a successful operation after being taken to the hospital. His death was due to other causes.

Mr. Simpson was born in Marion county March 17, 1854, lived his early years at Walla Walla and then to Whitman county, and back to Salem in 1905. Surviving are nine children: Thomas of Walla Walla; Judge George B. W. A. of Leland, Wash.; and Earl of Salem; Mrs. Elmer Littlehales and Miss Edith Simpson of Portland; Mrs. Everett Cate of Dallas; Mrs. Frank Bottana and Miss Ruby Simpson of Portland; and a sister, Mrs. Lema Bohannon of Portland.

Funeral services will be at Vancouver, but arrangements were not completed today at Knapp's chapel.

Former Seattle Residents Moving Into Beautiful New Home Erected For Them at Kingwood Drive Peak

KINGWOOD, June 9.—Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Hotte are moving into their stately new home on the highest point of Kingwood Drive, being a part of the Charles Adams land and affords almost a bird's eye view of Salem and the surrounding country.

The seven-room shingled house with its many distinctive windows is the last word in modern convenience. It stands in a grove of giant oaks and is approached indirectly by a winding driveway outlined by shrubs and flowers. The direct approach to the steep slope from the north is by graduated concrete steps bordered by rock gardens and a pool.

Living Room Lovely
The heart of this beautiful house is the living room 20 by 30 feet with 12 foot walls from which rises a beamed ceiling sloping upwards to a greater height. From the corner of the room, overlooking the city is a bow window with a circular seat embracing an inlaid built in writing table of oak. The ceiling and other woodwork is of hand-hewn oak.

The huge fireplace is of gray and red granite with a balcony above leading to the upper rooms. This is approached by a uniquely beautiful stairway with flat carved posts.

Hotte, who is a native New Yorker of German ancestry has been around the world four times and in the course of his travels has collected many beautiful things to grace his home. Mrs. Hotte, who was born in Cologne has also traveled extensively and lived at one time in the Tyrolean mountains of Italy. She is an accomplished linguist and musician.

The Hottes came here last fall from Seattle where they had lived the last four years.
