Old Time Fete Plans Started

STAYTON, June 10.—No, the barbers at Stayton haven't gone on a strike, but they probably will before July 18, that is if the male population here can "hold out" in their declaration to let their whiskers grow until after the big celebration featuring the dedication of Stayton's new city hall.

At the last meeting of the fire department it was unanimously voted to give the celebration an old time atmosphere by encouraging the males of the district to grow whiskers and mustaches, of whatever design they prefer.
