(Continued from page 1) ing probably would not begin until late this month.

The Slate Construction company crew, using trucks, a big power shovel and a bulldozer, will complete rough grading of the 200-foot square east half of the project today, M. C. Slate, who is supervising the job, said yesterday. Completion of the west half, of like size, may be delayed past the contract date, June 16, to permit laying of the 18-inch main and a 36-inch concrete drain pipe in a deep trench along Rural avenue to the site of the valve control station, which will be built at the dividing wall between the two storage units.

The total cost of the reservoir, including excavation and general contracts, material purchases and main installation work being done by the city, will be approximately \$145,000. Into the project under the general contract will go 250 tons of steel, 8.1 tons of copper joints, 5510 cubic yards of concrete and 2500 feet of drain pipe.

Northwest Gains Delegation Avers

CLEVELAND, June 12.—(P)—Ten tired but happy delegates from Oregon generally expressed satisfaction tonight over the London-Knox ticket and platform approved by the republican convention.

As they prepared to depart for their homes, some to travel by rail, others by motor, the delegates were unanimous in averring the nominees and platform would win at the November election.

The Oregonians voted as a unit for London and Knox.

Walter Tooze, chairman, said one of the outstanding achievements of the delegation was the caucus of delegations from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana at which a Pacific northwest platform for inclusion in the party platform was adopted.

"We got everything we asked for, including planks against the reciprocal trade agreement law and in favor of adequate tariff protection for domestic markets and for states' rights in water conservation," Tooze said.
