#### Gifts of Value Given to O. S. C.

CORVALLIS, June 12 .- Gifts and grants totaling \$158,358.19, not including the PWA grant towards the construction of the new ed this year at commencement time as having been received during the past year by various divisions and departments of Oregon State college or for work carried on throughout the state under direction of the college.

The largest of the items listed are under federal emergency cooperation on projects aimed primarily to provide employment, but which resulted in valuable additions to campus equipment and service. Among the items listed under this head are \$38 .-207 for employment of needy students, the institution receiving the benefit of the work performed; \$48,885 for campus WPA projects, and \$26,097 for statewide WPA research work directed by college specialists.

The larger gifts to the library totaled more than \$5000, and to trail England 2 to 1. the school of science for research, \$22,295. Private gifts for riculture aggregated \$8,638, while Palfrey Fabyan, Mrs. John Van gifts or indefinite loans of equipment to the school of engineering amounted to \$8,145.14. School of pharmacy gifts were listed at \$629.20, and the division of physical education for men, \$250. Many contributions to the Horner museum of the Oregon country and to the school of science herbarium were listed without definite valuation.
