

Woodburn Once More Tops Legion Junior Contest in County

Downs Salem Team 12 to 5

Perennial Champs Get Big Lead Early; Two Games Slated For Sunday

Woodburn's slugging junior Legion team got back to its accustomed top hole position in the Marion county series as it battered two Salem pitchers for a 12 to 5 win on Olinger field yesterday afternoon.

Bunched hits in the first three innings accounted for the Woodburn victory. The Woodburn batters bit into the offerings of LeRoy Bright for nine hits in 2-1-3 innings and scored nine of their run in that period.

Bud Eland, who relieved Bright after the damage was mostly done, kept the count down to three hits for the rest of the tilt and though Woodburn scored three more runs only one was earned.

Woodburn opened up with two runs in the first inning on three hits. The real damage was done in the second when Whitman, Woodburn shortstop, put on a home run with the bases populated.

Woodburn added another run that inning to make the count 7 to 0 before Salem scored.

Salem collected two runs in its half of the second on hits by Skoppl and Meyers, two walks and an error but Woodburn came back with two more in the third.

Myers singled with the bases loaded in the third to give Salem two more tallies and Skoppl hit in the fourth to score Eland and send Krupicka, Woodburn pitcher, to the showers. That was the end of Salem scoring.

Whitman, who relieved Krupicka, kept Salem hits scattered. Woodburn scored again in the fifth, seventh and ninth innings.

Salem will play at Stayton and Woodburn will entertain Mt. Angel in Sunday's games.

Gifts of Value Given to O. S. C.

CORVALLIS, June 12.—Gifts and grants totaling \$158,358.19, not including the PWA grant towards the construction of the new health service building, were listed this year at commencement time as having been received during the past year by various divisions and departments of Oregon State college or for work carried on throughout the state under direction of the college.

The largest of the items listed are under federal emergency cooperation on projects aimed primarily to provide employment, but which resulted in valuable additions to campus equipment and service. Among the items listed under this head are \$38,207 for employment of needy students, the institution receiving the benefit of the work performed; \$48,885 for campus WPA projects, and \$26,097 for state-wide WPA research work directed by college specialists.

The larger gifts to the library totaled more than \$5000, and to the school of science for research, \$22,295. Private gifts for research under the school of agriculture aggregated \$8,638, while gifts or indefinite loans of equipment to the school of engineering amounted to \$8,145.14. School of pharmacy gifts were listed at \$629.20, and the division of physical education for men, \$250. Many contributions to the Homer museum of the Oregon country and to the school of science herbarium were listed without definite valuation.

Improved Angling Due For Weekend

PORTLAND, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—The state fish commission found more encouragement for weekend anglers today.

Streams were reported clearing and lake fishing improving in most areas.

Clackamas county fly fishing was good and improvement was noted in the McKenzie and Callapa rivers and Wiley creek in Linn and Lane counties. The Necanicum river in Clatsop county was clearing rapidly.

Fly fishermen were expected to find coastal lakes in the southern half of the state a fertile field.

Trout and bass were biting well in streams of Coos, Curry and Douglas counties. The lower Rogue river remained high, as did streams in Wallowa county.

Limit catches were reported from Paulina and East Lake in Deschutes county. Fishing also was reported good in other central and north central Oregon lakes and streams.

Senators and Peppery Young Brewers Will Clash Sunday Here With Bevens And "Red" Miller Mound Adversaries

SALEM'S undefeated Senators will take to Olinger field Sunday afternoon against a bunch of peppery kids in Hop Gold uniforms for a State league battle that will be a classic if anything like the Salem-Hop Gold brawls of last year.

With practically no threat of rain or cloudy weather that last week made the Senators call off their scheduled game with Toledo the two teams will go to the post at 2:30 o'clock for a battle that is usually something of a grudge affair.

The fact that "Frisco" Edwards, Salem manager, and Ray Brooks, Hop Gold head, are bitter enemies, at least on the diamond, has been brought home to Senator fans many times by the vociferous arguments, accompanied by gestures, the two carry on.

Hop Gold lost its opening game to Bend but came back to humble Woodburn 5 to 2. Oscar "Red" Miller, veteran semi-pro pitcher, will probably be on the slab for the Keggies when they face Salem Sunday. Bill Bevens, who was supposed to pitch last Sunday against Toledo, will hurl for the Senators.

Brooks' aggregation of youngsters includes some of the state's outstanding prospects. Gale Smith, lanky University of Oregon freshman, will be on first; Bob Baer on second, Riley Richards, shortstop, and Gordon Williamson, third.

The second American doubles team rallied after it trailed 0-3 in the final set, and Miss Babcock and Mrs. Van Ryn beat Nancy Lyle and Evelyn Dearman, 6-2, 1-6, 6-3.
