market proprietor, who has served on school boards in Oregon and in the east, and T. B. "Tom" Hill, prominent member of the Ameri-can Legion, and confectionery shop proprietor.

Neptune, who is reputed to have general Townsend club support, accepted the nomination at the urging of citizens who are "inter-ested in the economical conduct of school affairs," according to a statement issued in his behalf last night by M. B. Stegner. He has been in business at his recent lo-cation for nine years.

"Mr. Neptune has been a citizen and taxpayer of Salem for the past 25 years," the campaign statement says, "and is vitally in-terested in the welfare of the city and its schools, and if elected he will work for the efficient and economical conduct of school af-fairs."

Hill's interest in be-coming a school board member is that of a parent of school chil-dren, of which he has three, he said last night.

"I'm making no promises," Hill declared. "I have children in grade, junior and senior high school and if elected will seek to administer school district affairs with equal regard for both pupils and teachers."
