"These Three" Elsinore Film

Most-Discussed Drama of Year Is Offered on Double Program

"These Three," Samuel Goldwyn's powerful new screen drama, brings Miriam Hopkins, Merle Oberon and Joel McCrea to the Elsinore theatre today.

The most talked-about story of the year, this Lillian Hellman screen play depicts how a whispering campaign growing out of a child's malicious lie nearly wrecked the lives of three innocent people.

This historic phrase sets the keynote for "Till We Meet Again," stirring story of a devotion to country that was strong enough to tear a man from the arms of his sweetheart. The picture opens today at the Capitol theatre, with Herbert Marshall and Gertrude Michael sharing leading honors.

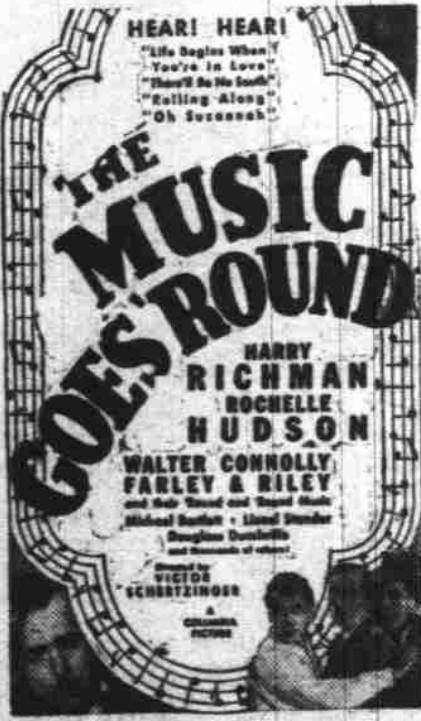
The second feature at the Capitol is "The Big Fight" with Guinn Williams.

Many Get Steady Jobs, Past Week

One hundred fifty eight men and women obtained steady jobs through the state employment office here last week while 321 received assignments to work in the berry fields, Marie Baker, district statistician, announced yesterday. With 18 new applications for employment received during the week, the job agency's list of persons desiring work nevertheless dropped from 5634 to 5494, of whom 4766 were men and 728 were women.

Private employment increased last week until placements were not far below those on public works and relief projects. Sixty one men and seven women received assignments to private jobs, 87 men to public works and three women to WPA positions. Four of the PWA jobs were in other counties.

Deadline Is Near For Work Sheets

Warning was issued yesterday by Harry Riches, county agent, that farmers who desire to benefit from the agricultural conservation program should file their work sheets within the next few days. Already 800 Marion county farmers have filled in the work sheets which makes them eligible for the program. The date for final filing will soon be reached, according to Riches.

Especially interest in the program has been shown by farmers since provision for orchards and the control of noxious weeds was included. Riches states. The possibility that liming may be included at \$2.50 an acre should also prove an added inducement, he declares.

Although it may not be possible for some farmers to comply with the program this year it would be well to file the work sheets in order to be able to take advantage of the 1937 program, Riches advises.
