Trinity Church Sponsors Passion Play in Movies

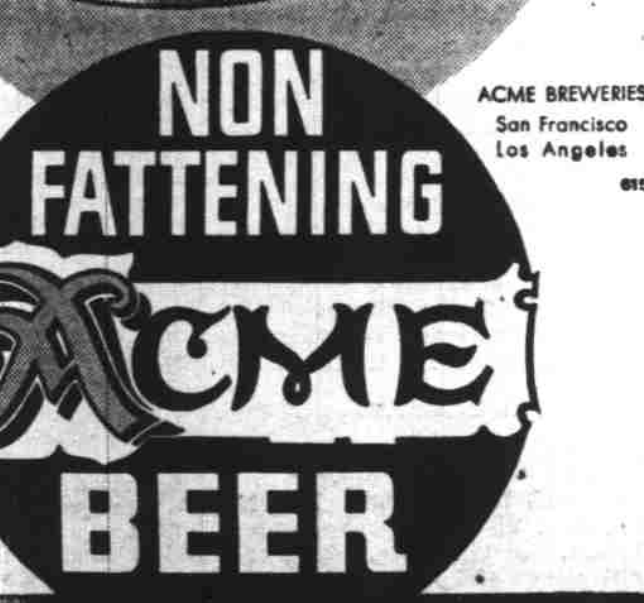
