

Many Changes in School Board Personnel Follow Upon Elections

Gentle Named For Monmouth

Hazel Green Ups Salaries; Heights Approves More Land

MONMOUTH, June 16.—The annual election of one director and clerk Monday afternoon, was fairly well attended. F. E. Murdock who served as a director for many years, asked that he be not considered again for reelection.

The names of James Gentle and Carl Iverson were placed in nomination for director; and P. E. Chambers, clerk for the past 14 years, was nominated. Gentle received 23 votes, Iverson 28. Chambers was the unanimous choice for clerk.

VICTOR POINT, June 16.—At the annual school meeting held here last night the budget as prepared by the school board, requiring no special tax, was accepted by the voters. Paul Jaquet, retiring chairman, was elected director for a three year term and Mrs. Paul Jaquet, clerk, was re-elected.

Elect Two Women
LIBERTY, June 16.—The annual school meeting for Liberty district was held Monday night. The budget was adopted in its entirety by quite a narrow margin. The budget includes teacher's salaries, maintenance costs for the school building and the new gym building, also cost of bus transportation to Salem high and junior high schools.

Mrs. C. W. Stacey received the majority of votes for school director and Mrs. Roy Farrand was elected clerk, retiring C. C. Sargeant and W. H. Walker, who were not candidates for reelection. E. B. Houser will be chairman of the board for the next year. Ballots were cast for candidates for non-union high school district board, Roy Rice receiving 127 votes and Cass Nichols 18 votes.
