

More Election Reports Given

Annual Meeting at Gates Almost Ends in Row in Close Vote

GATES, June 17.—The annual school meeting held at the Gates high school Monday night resulted in the election of Alfred Millap of Niagara as director, taking the place of L. W. Kelle, who has served the past six years. Harold Wilson received three more votes than Mrs. Maud Davis for clerk. Mrs. Davis has held the office for the past 15 years. The results of the count for clerk nearly ended in a bout as both nominees had strong support. The financial report showed the district well out of debt. Some discussion followed concerning any remodeling that may be done in order to comply with requirements for the physical education course which will be given in the high school the coming year.

GERVAIS, June 17.—The annual meeting of school district No. 76 was held Monday night. Ross Cutsforth, retiring chairman, was re-elected for a three year term. J. C. Adams was elected to fill out the unexpired term of John S. Harper, who has moved to Salem. G. J. Moisan was re-elected clerk. Robert Harper automatically becomes chairman of the board. The disbanded Parent-Teacher association turned over to the board a sum of about \$30 to be used to improve the play shed.

ALBANY, June 17.—In one of the heaviest polls cast in a school election for directors, in district No. 5, comprising the city of Albany and surrounding territory, D. E. 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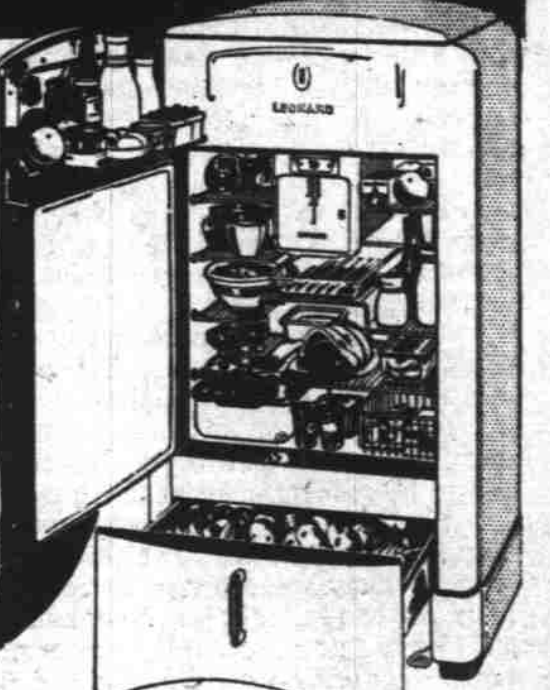
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
