Dedicate Sequoia Tree, Waldo Park

The sequoia tree which William Valdo, Salem pioneer, planted in 1872 at what is now the west side of Summer street a few feet north of Union, last night was dedicated to him and the tiny plot of ground surrounding it formally named Waldo park by the Salem chapter of the American War Mothers last night. Ten war mothers circled the tree and recited a dedicatory ritual.

Waldo purchased the redwood sprout from an itinerant peddler, Mrs. Mabel Lockwood, who presided, told the dedication audience. She pointed out that George Brown, who was present last night, was a descendant of the Waldo family.
