## News From Front Brought by Radio

Salem radio transmitting amateurs arranged yesterday to receive news dispatches direct from the national guard encampment at Fort Stevens and Camp Clatsop to keep Statesman readers informed as to the activities of Salem men belonging to Headquarters battery, 349th coast artillery, the medical detachment and Company B, 152nd infantry. The first dispatch, received direct from Fort Stevens by radio at 10:30 o'clock last night is published today.

Jerry de Broekert, operator of amateur station W78Y and Ed Heenan, operator of W7ECH, arranged before the guardsmen left here Tuesday to make contact with the stations taken to Fort Stevens and to receive the news for the benefit of their families and friends in Salem. Operators on the Fort Stevens end of the radio hookup are Private, First Class, J. Wayne Taylor, W7DIW, and Private Milton L. Marsh, W7FAL, both of Salem, Taylor and Marsh took station W7FNZ from the armory here with them to Fort Stevens.

These amateur operators offered this news service, which could not be had by regular news services, free of charge, in accordance with amateur's code of ethics and with the regulations of the federal communications commission. The national guard and news messages they will handle during the next two weeks will be largely in radiotelegraph code.

## Aid Provided For 5 Blind Persons

Financial assistance has been approved for five blind persons in Marion county under the new state-federal social securities agreement, it was announced yesterday by Glenn C. Niles, executive secretary for the county relief committee. The initial payments recommended by the committee averaged \$30 each.

Assistance for the blind is not as restricted in regard to residence as is old age assistance, Niles said. To be eligible for the new type of payments, persons must have lost their sight in Oregon or at least to have lived in the state five out of the last nine years and the last year continuously. The payments, however, as with those to the aged, are granted anywhere the recipients need them to exist, Niles said.

The relief committee also has approved old age payments averaged \$19.88 each to 55 new applicants.
