South Is Cool to Roosevelt, Claim

Floyd Ellis Returns From Trip, Says Landon Is Widely Favored

The democratic party is not going to have an easy time of electing Franklin D. Roosevelt as president next November, Floyd Ellis, Salem business man, said yesterday he had found during a 9000-mile motor swing around the nation during the last 30 days. Ellis returned here late Tuesday night.

"Down in the south lots of democrats are swinging away from Roosevelt," Ellis declared. "Many of them told me they liked this man Landon."

In the southern states a large percentage of the small merchants, especially, are against Roosevelt, Ellis reported. He said prominent democrats in San Antonio, Texas, told him they would vote for Landon, whom they admire.

Record Is Admired
"Kansas was the worst state in the union until Landon was elected governor," Ellis said. "It was told 'in two years he balanced their budget. They think he's pretty good.'"

Waldron Hillpot, who accompanied Ellis as far east as Flint, Mich., to take delivery on a new automobile, will not return for several days, Ellis said.

After handling business matters in New York city and Washington, D. C., Ellis drove south to Alabama for a visit with relatives, then westward by the southern route with special stops in Louisiana and Texas.
