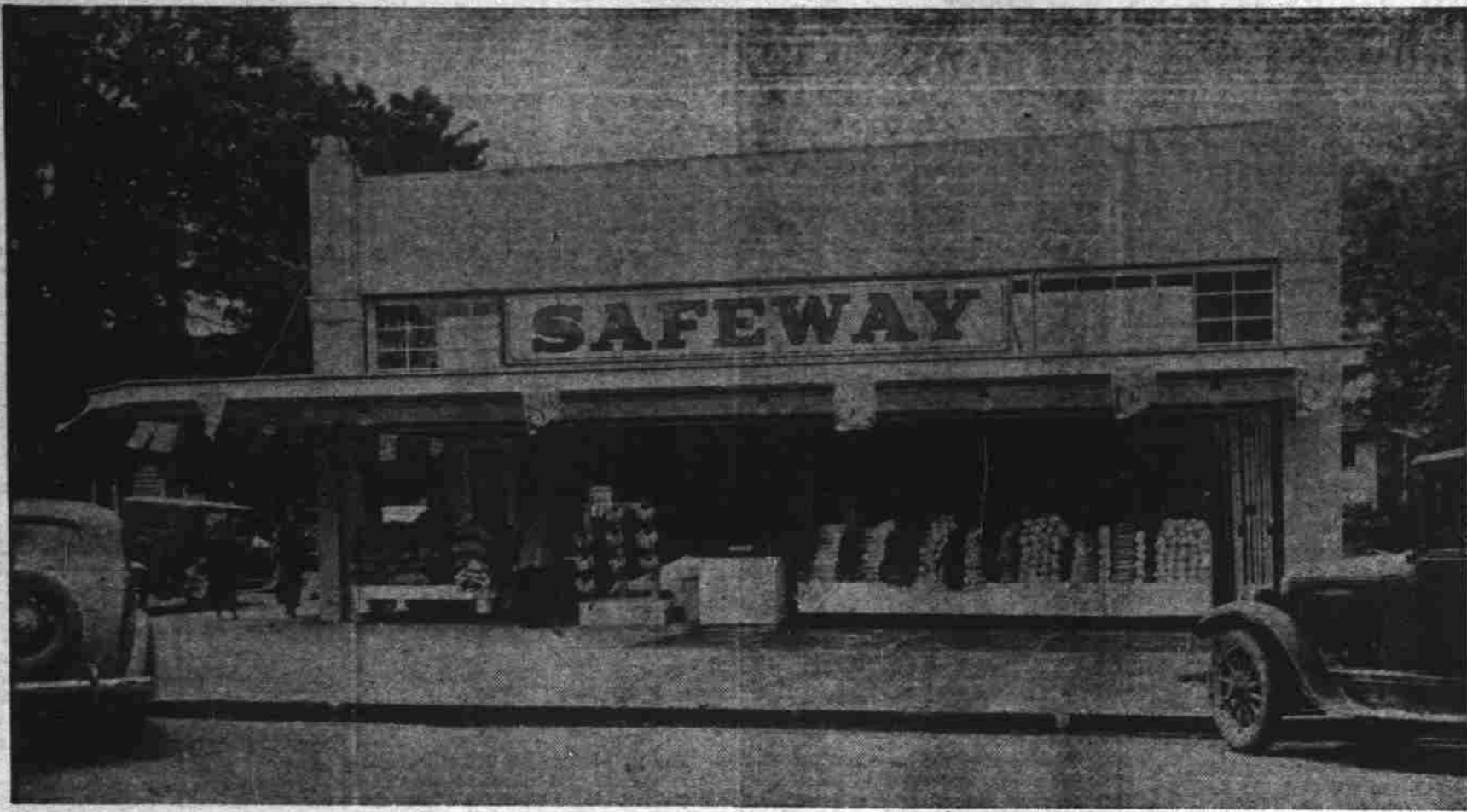


New Store Just Opened by Safeway Organization Here

Salem Company Finds Guardsmen's Life Is Busy and Exacting One on Initial Day at Annual Encampment

Company B, 162d Infantry CAMP OLATSOP, June 17 (Special)—Tuesday, awaited with pleasure by privates and officers alike but feared by recruits, started at 4 a. m. Bleary eyed, tired and impatient guardsmen started straggling in at the armory in the wee small hours that morning and started for the depot about 5:30 a. m.; the train left at 8 o'clock. The trip was long and tiring, punctuated with unexpected splashes of cold water, card games and so on. We arrived at camp about 3 p. m.

The camp was pretty well set up except the interior of squad tents (bunks, squad boxes, sweeping and general policing up.) Private Connie Schneider got the distinction of being number one on the injury list. (Nothing serious; just a scratch.)

Our first detail was baggage carting. The reconstructed campsite is so situated that a flight of stairs must be mounted from the street to the company street. After three truck loads of baggage were distributed, we received our physical examinations. A few of the men hurried by the foot examination, such as Recruit Private Byron "Tablefoot" Randall.

Of course all the men are tired. We stood retreat with a parade. All the Brass Hats (officers) lined up and glowered down on our weary brows, stood us at parade rest till our spine became curved, then at present arms till our corporal's arm went to sleep, and finally marched us all over the sand dunes in a 40-mile gale.

Board Stands Pat Upon Logan Price

There will be no reduction in the 4 cent minimum price of loganberries set by the Oregon loganberry control board. This was the information contained in a letter mailed to Salem canners yesterday after the board had taken a poll on maintaining the minimum price set about a month ago.

A portion of the logan's have been bought by local packers at the 4 cent price, but lately the canners have been reluctant to take the berries at the growers' price, feeling that by harvest time the board would weaken and set a lower figure.

To ease the situation and to encourage the packers to get into the field the board authorized a modified contract which will allow the buyer to pay the lower price in case the board should set a new minimum.

At the same time, while authorizing the modification of the contracts, the board representatives stated definitely there would be no reduction made.
