TAFT, June 18.—With the weatherman predicting perfect weather for the weekend, residents of North Lincoln county are planning on entertaining the largest crowd in its history during the sixth annual Redhead Roundup, which will be staged at Taft on Saturday and Sunday.

The Salem Cherlans will have charge of the coronation ceremonies for the Roundup queen, which is scheduled for Saturday afternoon.

Historic Church
To Be Scene For
Pioneer Reunion

SCIO, June 18.—Descendants of Joab Powell and other pioneers will gather Sunday, June 21, for an all-day observance at historic Providence Baptist church nine miles south of Scio. The celebration is the 15th annual service held in honor of the founding of the church 83 years ago. The present frame structure stands on the site of the log church built in 1853 by Circuit Rider Joab Powell and his followers.

A marble memorial tablet standing in front of the church tells of the founding and history. An association has been formed for perpetual care of the adjoining cemetery, where Joab Powell and other pioneers are interred. Abe Powell, last surviving son of the circuit rider, was buried in the cemetery only a few years ago.

Morning call to order will be by Rev. Henry Albers, presiding pastor, at 10 o'clock. Dr. F. W. Starring, Portland, will preach.

Basket lunch will be served at noon in the fir grove of the church grounds. Coffee and ice water will be furnished. Call to order for the afternoon meeting will be at 2 p. m. Rev. LeRoy Crossley, Lebanon, will preach.
