An official communique disclosed the cabinet had agreed to "accept" the lifting of sanctions. It said:

"The government, faithful to the principle of collective action, will associate itself with any decision adopted by the League of Nations."

"Informed of the present situation of the sanctions question, it felt consideration of facts led it to accept their lifting."

Whether the economic penalties will be lifted immediately was not disclosed. Although they will not end officially until the league acts, it was felt sanctions are ended now so far as France is concerned.
