Stock Already At Fairground

Public Inspection Slated Sunday; Indians to Be Attraction

MOLALLA, June 19.—With 15 head of choice bucking horses already on the grounds, a large shipment of wild horses from Eastern Washington and Oregon on its way here, and cowboys and special performances arriving daily, Molalla is again making preparations for its annual Buckaroo. A three-day show is scheduled for this year, July 3, 4 and 5.

It is planned to have the Buckeroo grounds open to public inspection Sunday, June 28. The stock, which includes in addition to the horses a shipment of Brahma steers and Texas longhorns, will be on the grounds then. The Indian teepee village will also be up just outside the Buckeroo gates.

The Warm Springs Indians, who were secured principally because they own elaborate beaded regalia, will be one of the main attractions to the show this year. They will appear in parades, races and ceremonial dances. Other additions will include a patriotic program the morning of July 4, a fireworks display that evening, moving picture shows each evening on the grounds and longer morning parades, with prizes for the winners. The usual concessions will line the streets. The Molalla Firemen will give evening dances.

Bucking horses will be saddled in the arena this year, instead of in the chutes. The saddling of horses is exciting to watch, and the spectators lose many thrills when this is done in the chutes. Buckeroo officials have decided. Bareback riders will come out of the chutes. Broncho riding, bull-dogging, calf roping, steer riding, bareback riding, the Buckeroo derby, when horses are released at 15 second intervals, trick riding and roping and many races are on the schedule for the three days. A prize will be given the best all-around cowboy.

Two pairs of trick riders and ropers, both new to the Buckeroo fans, have been signed up for this year. They are Frank and Bernice Dean, of San Jose, who have an international reputation and appear regularly in the larger rodeos, and Lee and Christy U. LeRoy, Ukiah, also experienced performers. The Deans are already in Molalla. Negotiations are also underway with a Mexican trick rider, who does several unusual stunts.

Shows will start promptly each day at 2 p. m. Those persons wishing to combine a holiday picnic with seeing the Buckeroo will find many picnic spots along the Molalla river a short distance from Molalla. There are also picnic grounds in Molalla.

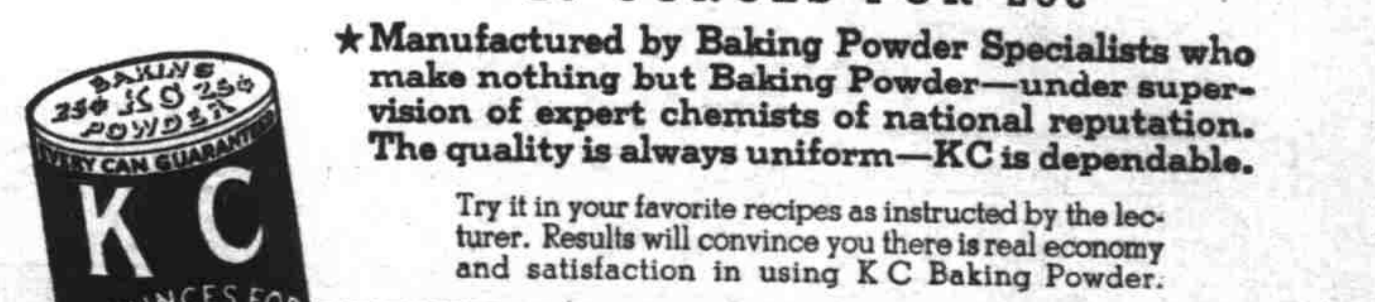
