

Relief Bill Signed, Funds to Continue Works Program Authorized

State Control Enlarged Now

Billion and Half May Be Spent, Work Relief; Payrolls Gain

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—Continued federal jobs for 2,300,000 unemployed who are on relief or certified as "in need of relief" were assured today when President Roosevelt signed into law the deficiency-relief bill carrying \$1,425,000,000 to be spent chiefly by the works progress administration.

With organization of the new program virtually completed by Harry L. Hopkins, orders directing state WPA administrators to select relief workers locally and to assume a larger share of other responsibilities, the WPA was expected to draw on the new fund immediately.

Except for \$55,000,000 earmarked for the resettlement administration, the new relief fund will be spent by the WPA under the president's direction.

FWA Authorization Due

An executive order providing money for WPA, which has been financed in recent months by transfers from other agencies, and another authorizing Secretary Ickes to make \$300,000,000 in loans and grants from the PWA revolving fund, was expected to be issued soon.

A total of \$2,375,397,537 was appropriated by the deficiency relief act, including \$458,631,860 for the social security program and \$308,000,000 for emergency conservation work.

In contrast to the eight months

required last year to get the present \$4,000,000,000 work program underway, few changes in the relief administration were needed in the new program.

In procedure, borrowed from the old CWA, which Hopkins also directed, however, state and local administrators hereafter not only will select workers but will decide how many hours a month they must work and which of the \$4,000,000,000 worth of projects already approved but not begun, will be carried out.

Job Quotas Planned

The Washington office will assign each state's quota in jobs and money out of the \$2,300,000 job average to be provided by WPA during the 12 months beginning July 1.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—An increase in employment and payrolls during May in contrast to usual seasonal trends was reported today by the labor department.

The department said that 88,000 workers were returned to employment last month and total weekly payrolls increased approximately \$6,700,000 over April.

Grand Jury Will Meet Wednesday

The Marion county grand jury was yesterday called to convene at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning at the courthouse, but as far as was evident only routine matters were to come before the body.

Either District Attorney W. H. Trindle or Deputy District Attorney Lyle J. Page will conduct the business before the grand jury tomorrow, as it is expected that Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general who has conducted the investigation into gambling in this county before the secret body off and on since last September, will have nothing to bring up this week.

A dozen cases, from justice courts, were expected to be investigated by the grand jurors. Those for which transcripts had been prepared yesterday were: State vs. George Williams, n.s.f. check charge; State vs. W. H. Aldrich, two charges, n.s.f. check and larceny by bailer; State vs. Joe Brown, charge of receiving stolen property; Deryl Shelton, charged with engaging in used car business without proper license.

C., June 22.—(AP)—A slim dark-haired Portland shotmaker, Miss Marion McDougall, set the pace with an 80 in the qualifying round of the Pacific northwest golf title hunt over the tree-lined Shughnessy course today, a figure which proved too good for even the titleholder, Miss Barbara Thompson of Palo Alto, Calif., to match.

Thirty-two feminine stars, mostly United States players and including 15-year-old Margaret Veatch of Longview, Wash., who turned in a smart 88, qualified for the championship play which starts tomorrow.

Santiam Road Program Eyed

State Funds Held Not Available; Group to See Federal Man

Representatives from Salem, Mill City, Stayton and Astoria met yesterday with State Engineer R. H. Baldock to discuss possible improvement of the North Santiam highway between Mill City and Detroit.

Emphasizing that the road, especially between Gates and Niagara, where it is a state highway, and between Niagara and Detroit, where it is maintained by the federal government through the Willamette national forest, is in bad condition for the amount of travel which is now going over it, the men from the Santiam towns requested the state to improve as much of the highway as it could immediately.

Baldock agreed that improvements needed, but affirmed that funds are at present lacking for immediate improvement, which must also come with cooperation with the federal bureau of public roads.

Another impediment, he said, lay in the proposal of the federal flood control program for the Willamette valley to dam the North Santiam either at Niagara or below Detroit. New alignment of the road or improvement of the old, would depend on the situation of the dam.

Committee to Confer

At the conclusion of the meeting, it was agreed to send a committee tomorrow or Thursday to confer with W. H. Lynch, district engineer of the bureau of public roads, and another to convene with the state highway commission at its next monthly meeting.

Present were all members of the Marion county court, including Judge J. C. Siegmund, Roy Melson and Leroy Hewlett; James E. Smith, representing the W. P. A.; Oscar D. Olson and C. E. Wilson of the Salem chamber of commerce; Howard R. Grimm and Carl T. Pope, from Stayton; George R. Duncan, George Keech and A. C. Van Nuy, from Astoria; Theodore Higginberger; and from Mill City, D. B. Hill and Dr. W. W. Allen.

Moody to Insist, Minto Trial Date

Anticipating an attempt for counsel for the defense, in the case of Police Frank Minto, to have the trial set for next Monday morning delayed on the grounds that Minto's health will not allow him to go on trial at that time, Special Prosecutor Moody yesterday told Judge E. C. Latourette that he will insist that Minto come to trial as scheduled, and that he, Moody, will call the state's witnesses for trial at that time.

Moody suggested a hearing on the matter prior to the trial date, and pointed out that Minto was able to testify in the case last week against Orey G. Coffey, prior to Coffey's conviction on a charge of accepting a bribe.

In event a showing as to Minto's health is requested by his attorney, John Carson, the court will call a physician in, Judge Latourette stated. Moody also said that the state would have his own doctor make an examination if it becomes necessary.

Ken Black Leads Northwest Play

POINT GREY GOLF CLUB, VANCOUVER, B. C., June 22.—(AP)—A poker-faced young Vancouver amateur, Ken Black, of the Shughnessy Heights golf club, clicked his way with precision today to lead a field of 78 in the first 18 of the 36-hole qualifying round of the Pacific northwest golf association tournament. He carded 70 on the par 71 course.

Black stroked his way over the course in one stroke better than even figures despite flitting gusts of wind that played havoc with tee shots and second for the majority of the field, including the defending champion, Albert "Scotty" Campbell, Seattle.

Campbell was three strokes back of the leader, tied with a young amateur of British Columbia shotmaker Ernie Walls, both with 73's.

Orders For 2970 Railway Cars In

Orders for construction of 2550 freight cars and 20 baggage cars, costing approximately \$2,000,000, have been placed by Southern Pacific, it was announced today by G. M. Betterson, purchasing agent for the company.

The new rolling stock for handling freight shipments represents the largest equipment purchase since 1929, and is in line with Southern Pacific's widespread expansion and improvement program outlined by A. D. McDonald, president, last November.

Two hundred flat cars, 100 gondola cars and 150 stock cars are to be constructed in facilities of Southern Pacific at Sacramento, Betterson said.

Orders placed with various car manufacturers call for 1750 50-ton steel sheathed box cars, 500 50-foot steel sheathed automobile cars, 250 40-foot steel sheathed automobile cars and 20 80-foot all steel baggage-horse cars.

With announcement of the new purchases, it was pointed out that orders had recently been given for the construction of 2700 new refrigerator cars; involving a cost of \$10,000,000, for the Pacific Fruit Express company, jointly owned by Southern Pacific and Union Pacific, to improve handling of perishable shipments.

Neer Slated For School Chairman

W. F. Neptune, newly elected school director, will take his position on the board at its meeting tonight, succeeding Walter Minter. The board will also have before it the election of a chairman and clerk for the coming year.

Frank Neer will come in for nomination as chairman, being the member with the longest period served of his present term. W. H. Burghardt, clerk for 22 years, is expected to be reelected to the position without opposition.

Besides the reorganization of the board, several new teachers may come up for appointment to night upon recommendation of Superintendent Gaiser.

Lightning Holds Up British Open

HOVLAK, Eng., June 22.—(AP)—An electrical storm struck Hovlake and Wallasey today, unleashing one bolt of lightning that stunned three spectators and a caddy, and washed out 40 scores in the qualifying round of the British open golf championship, including a record-breaking 67 by Henry Cotton, the 1934 champion.

Greens on the two qualifying courses were five to six inches deep in water when the storm was over and the tournament committee decided to cancel all posted scores and order a new start tomorrow.

Roy Rice Named, Non-High Board

With a majority of 33 votes, Roy Rice of Roberts was yesterday declared new member from zone three of the non-high school board of education for Marion county, following the canvass made by the board members of the vote cast June 15 in connection with the annual school election.

Rice drew 252 votes and Cass Nichols, the only other aspirant, 219 votes. Two defective votes were thrown out and one was cast for F. Edwards of Roberts.

The board yesterday heard the financial report for the year and reached the decision that no audit of the non-high district bills could be accomplished until the audit of the regular school district books was completed. However, the non-high board will issue all warrants as of July 15.

C. A. Ratcliff, who has been chairman of the board, is the retiring member. He did not run for reelection. Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, is secretary to the board.

State Sells Half Million, Liquor

Net profits of the state liquor commission for the month of May aggregated \$160,312.23, according to a financial statement filed with the secretary of state.

Profits from stores and agencies totaled \$104,635.42, with a profit of \$548,178.55 for the first five months of this year.

The license division showed a profit of \$5476.32 for May and \$213,975.66 for the first five months of 1936.

Privilege taxes for the first five months of 1936 aggregated \$225,256.09, with a profit of \$50,200.48 for May.

The gross liquor sales for May were \$546,772.10, and \$2,708,311 for the first five months of the year.

James E. Tait was born in Trimden, England, on October 16, 1869. He came to the United States with his parents when but six weeks of age. Living in Williamstown, Penn., until he was 19 years old, he went to Butte, Mont., where he remained until 1918 when he came to Oregon. For three years after coming to Oregon he made his home in Shedd where he has lived for the past 15 years. He was a barber by trade and was working in his shop at Shedd when taken ill.

Surviving are a brother, Jacob H. Tait of Denver, Colo., and a twin sister, Mrs. Agnes Clark of Shedd.
