

Retreat Ends At Mt. Angel

Plans Are Made to Boost
Future Attendance,
Youth Angle

—MT. ANGEL, June 23.—The Laymen's Retreat which was held at Mt. Angel college through Friday and Saturday came to a successful close Sunday morning. Ninety-eight men outside of Mt. Angel attended the retreat. These men came mainly from Oregon and Washington but various other states were also represented. Many prominent men from Salem attended and there was a very large delegation from Portland.

The retreat was conducted by Rt. Rev. Ignatius Esser, O. S. B., abbot of the Benedictine Abbey at St. Meinrad, Ind., and a well known speaker and educator. All officers of the Retreat Guild were re-elected. They are: P. N. Smith, Mt. Angel, president; E. L. Schomaker, Portland, first vice-president; J. A. Windishar, Salem, second vice-president; Leo Sander, Tillamook, third vice-president; and Arthur Kober, Mt. Angel, secretary-treasurer.

A special committee, consisting of Joseph Van Hoomissen, chairman, George E. Mangas, and Charles Bechtold, all of Portland, was appointed by President Smith to study further the methods and means of making this retreat even better known among the people and to increase the already large number of those attending these retreats at Mt. Angel.

Plans were made for the youths' retreat, which in the future is to receive special attention from the guild. Various promoters were appointed in the different parishes and communities to help further the cause.

Million in Road Jobs Will Be Let

Highway Revolving Fund
To Be Proposed to
Solons in 1937

Contracts involving more than \$1,000,000 will be considered at a meeting of the state highway commission in Portland Friday and Saturday.

The largest project involves the Rose Island bridge and road improvement which is an extension of the super highway. The cost of this improvement, including an underpass, was estimated at \$350,000.

Amendment to the existing laws increasing the state highway revolving fund from \$75,000 to \$250,000, will be sought at the next legislative session. R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer announced yesterday.

Would Avert Overdrafts
Baldock said such an increase in the revolving fund would permit the payment of salaries and other operating costs promptly without creating overdrafts.

An overdraft created two weeks ago in the amount of \$1200 was paid upon the return of the highway commission from southern Oregon. At the time the overdraft was created the highway commission had more than \$3,000,000 in another fund.

The commission left for Talent last night to hold a hearing in connection with the proposed relocation of the Pacific highway there. The proposed new highway skirts the town of Talent and the change is opposed by a number of merchants and garage owners.

Middle Road Is Dr. Hough's Idea

"The Two Highways" his topic, Dr. Lynn Harold Hough, former president of Northwestern university, drew deeply from Biblical example and personal experience Monday night in illustrating for a large crowd at the First Methodist church the alternative roads of exclusiveness, of bigotry in virtue, and of friendliness leading to commonness.

Illustrating from the biblical book of Ruth, from the story of Jonah, and by quoting from his own experience, Dr. Hough depicted the futility of both such ways of life if pursued exclusively. A reconciliation of the two, he saw, however, as the ultimate key to human happiness and virtue.

Two Million Pounds of Cherries to Be Picked in Lamberta's Orchards; Boasts 225 Acres and 13,500 Trees

Local visitors and residents will find a real sight in harvesting of cherries at the world's largest cherry groves, Lamberta orchards near Macleay, where more than two million pounds of fruit will be picked this year, on the basis of a conservative estimate.

The big 225-acre orchard has 13,500 trees and it is estimated at least 150 pounds of fruit per tree will be harvested this season, a total of 2,025,000 pounds, or 1012.5 tons.

The trees of uniform height and laden with fruit, are now 10 years old and are producing the greatest crop so far. The cherries are of excellent quality this year. The early Hooking and Waterhouse varieties have been harvested and picking of the largest crop, the Lamberts, is now getting under way and will last at least three more weeks.

A few more pickers can be handled, though no youths under 18 years of age are employed in the orchard, which has its own oak grove and campground facilities.

H. M. Sechler, in charge of the orchard this season, will give directions for reaching the orchard to any persons telephoning 4421 or 6336.

Call Special Vote To Elect Director

Kelley Resigns from Board
—Addison Considered
Successor

INDEPENDENCE, June 23.—A special school meeting for school district number 29 will be held at the Independence Training school June 29 at 8 o'clock to elect a director to serve the unexpired term of J. E. Kelley, who has resigned from the board. Kelley has been a member of the local school board for five years. The new director will be elected for one year.

At the recent school meeting A. W. Foster was elected director for three years, succeeding E. A. Dunckley, who has served the board for six years. Mr. Foster won election over Elmer E. Addison by three votes, and some feel that Mr. Addison will be the director chosen to complete the term resigned by Mr. Kelley.

Dr. Parr, from Oregon State college, and state inspector of local high schools, who inspected the school, has recommended that many repairs be made, including walls to prevent the rain from coming through, a new light system, stating the present one to be woefully inadequate, additional typewriters, new science equipment and other repairs. He urged that some of the school starts in the fall, and also stated it would be well to consider the possibility of a new high school. No action was taken on this movement at the school board meeting where the report was read.

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 23.—(AP)—Carl Lodell, manager of student activities at Oregon State college for 14 years, will be retained as director of inter-collegiate athletics under the new program effective July 1.

The O.C. athletic board, formed when athletics and student activities were divorced under a reorganization plan, announced Lodell's appointment had been approved by George W. Peavy, president of the board.

The board also voted to retain the present coaching staff: Ion Stiner, head-football mentor; A. T. Gill, basketball and baseball coach; Jim Dixon and Hal Moe, assistant football coaches. It was decided also to place Moe on a full time basis if the budget permits.

Scott May Assist
The statement issued by G. R. Hoerner, athletic board member, also said the group was recommending that George Scott, alumni secretary, become part-time assistant to Lodell to provide closer relations between athletics and alumni interests.

Scott formerly was a successful high school coach at Baker, Ore.

Court Throws Out Debris Odor Case

Portland's Petition for
Rehearing Is Denied;
Winter Reversed

The supreme court denied a petition for a rehearing in Portland's garbage odor case, in which the city was found liable to certain property owners for damages from odors from the garbage dump.

The court in another opinion handed down Tuesday reversed Judge John P. Winters of Multnomah county and held that a writ of attachment held by Nicola-Neppach company was invalid because the firm attached was bankrupt and that it was insolvent at the time of attachment with a petition for involuntary bankruptcy pending.

Another reversal of a Multnomah judge, George S. Shepherd, judge pro tem, was rendered in which William Addison was released from paying support money for his daughter because of violation by the mother of the terms of a divorce.

A petition for rehearing in the case of Niedermeyer vs. Fehl was denied; and a motion to dismiss in the case of Cox vs. Rand was denied.

Conditional Pardon Is
Given Multnomah Inmate

Governor Martin Tuesday issued a conditional pardon to Fred L. Sherman, who was received at the state penitentiary here March 11, 1935, to serve a term of two years for forgery. He was committed from Multnomah county.

Under the provisions of the parole Sherman will be turned over to the immigration authorities for deportation to England.

Auto Deaths Gain In Oregon in May

State Has 24 Fatalities
This Year, 13 Last;
Injuries Rise

Traffic fatalities in Oregon during May of this year aggregated 24 as compared to 13 in

May, 1935. Secretary of State Snell reported Tuesday. Persons injured increased from 398 in May last year to 613 this year. There were 2712 accidents in May this year as against 1795 in May a year ago. A total of 191 persons were killed in traffic accidents during the first five months of 1936 as compared to 88 during the same period in 1935. Accidents increased from 8440 to 11,056. Persons injured increased from 1939 during the period January 1, to May 31, 1935, to 2285 during the same period this year. Four fatalities in May resulted from accidents involving trains and automobiles. Four others involved pedestrians.
