

Mt. Angel Normal School Has Increase in Summer Registration

Typical Class Work Feature

Eight Cottonwood, Idaho, Sisters Come for Courses

MT. ANGEL, June 23.—Mt. Angel Normal school opened its summer session Monday morning with a registration much in excess of that of former years. Teachers from Mt. Angel, Scotts Mills, Woodburn and other places in this vicinity have enrolled. Eight sisters from Cottonwood, Idaho, are taking various courses.

About 20 children are expected to enroll in the atypical school. These children will receive the benefit of special atypical teaching, which work will be stressed during this year's summer school. Many children are being retarded in school, not because they lack ability, but because they are unable to learn according to the general methods in use. Atypical work devises a different technique for these children that has proved very successful.

Courses being offered included: religion; technique of teaching physical education; primary methods; psychology and teaching of atypical children; tests and measurements; English; American and English literature; children's literature; American and European history; Oregon history; principles of teaching; chemistry; biology; normal school art; music; Latin, French and German.

"They get nourishing food, real play, sunshine, and are taught to be useful and to live clean, moral lives. Our desire has been to teach them to admire everything that will uplift them."
