

Constitutional Issue Included

Pledges Effort to Raise Farm Revenues, Help Disaster Needy

St. erosion, checked, electricity and good roads brought to the farms and pledged continuation of such efforts along with a fair-minded administration quick to recognize and meet new problems.

Crop Insurance

Pledge Omitted

There was no crop insurance pledge, such as had been advocated by Secretary Wallace.

It favored production of "all the market will absorb both at home and abroad plus a reserve supply sufficient to insure fair prices to consumers."

It favored also loans on seasonal surpluses and retirement of sub-marginal lands.

A battle in committee over the Townsend old age pension plan, or some variation, did not materialize. The plan was suggested and voted down. Instead, the pledge was made to build foundations for the security of those who are faced with the hazards of unemployment and old age.

Pleas for a pronouncement in favor of minimum wages for women were answered with the line: "We have undertaken to put an end to the sweated labor of his (the worker's) wife and children."

The committee offered a promise vigorously and fearlessly to enforce anti-trust laws and write new ones as necessary.

Advocates of an extended civil service found in the document a pledge to extend the merit system to all non-policy-making positions in the federal service.

The platform pledged opposition to war as an instrument of national policy.

It pledged extension of the housing program, just treatment for war veterans and their dependents, opportunity for youth, drought and flood relief, and guardianship of civil liberties.

Eugene Air Meet Host on Saturday

Private Flyers to Compete in Events Including Altitude Attempt

EUGENE, June 25.—(Special)—With all plans complete, from nomination of committees to appointment of judges, the stage here is set for the second annual national air meet of the Private Flyers association, scheduled for this coming Saturday and Sunday.

More than 60 planes are expected from every part of the Pacific coast. They are to arrive Saturday afternoon. Prizes are offered for the first plane landing, the plane coming the greatest distance, the plane with the first woman pilot, the smallest plane and the largest plane.

Following their arrival, the entrants will be feted at a banquet and dance at the Osborn hotel here. Sunday the events get under way, with an assault on the world's altitude record for light planes at 10 a. m.

Bronze Awards Offered

Events will continue throughout the day, with a model airplane contest slated for younger members. Awards will be beautifully designed cast bronze plaques, bearing the shield of the P. F. A.

Another special event of the day Sunday will be efforts to establish short wave radio contact between a plane and the ground.

Mott Predicts Contest Issue

Returns Home After Heavy Congressional Session; to Open Offices

with instructions to the democratic majority to pass it," Mott said, adding that this method of handling legislation will be an issue in the coming presidential campaign.

Republicans Are Deciding Factor

Republican weight in the last congress has been felt strongest only on highly debatable measures, as when the Guffey coal act was stopped because of republican opposition. And this is about the only power which remains to the republicans—to be the deciding factor in case of a split democracy, Mott declared.

Oregon gained in the flood control measure especially, he said, since Willamette and lower Columbia river flood projects have been incorporated into the general flood control bill, and now only await appropriations from the federal government. The spring floods in the east he described as of great psychological importance in making eastern congressmen see the importance of immediate steps against all high-water threats.

Also favorable to this state were the usual rivers and harbors appropriations. Chemawa Indian school received its appropriation without question.

Champoeg Memorial

Bills to provide for a \$125,000 memorial at Champoeg and for \$25,000 restoration of the McLaughlin home at Oregon City are still in the lower house hopper, with a good outlook for favorable action next session.

Despite actual naval preference for an air base at Alameda, Calif.,

the Tongue Point location near Astoria has the backing of the house naval affairs committee, Mott said.

An old age pension bill of some sort, either in the form of the present McGroarty bill or some other, will eventually pass, thinks Mr. Mott.

"Nearly everyone now in congress believes that the eventual solution for old age security will be a pension of an amount sufficient for those who have reached an age where they are no longer economically productive to retire from competition, with those who are still earning," he explained.

"The most pressing question now is the way to raise the money to pay pensions."

"The campaign for Landon at the national republican convention was one of the most remarkable ones I ever knew of. His selection wasn't controlled by the bosses, but instead came from a genuine desire in the convention," Mott affirmed, having been in Cleveland at the time.

"If Landon is as good a candidate from now on as he has been up to now, he has a very good chance of getting to the white house. Both the liberals and the conservatives of the party are united behind his candidacy, and behind Knox's too."

"The administration has lost strength in the east, though how much is of course hard to tell," Mott added. "Landon's nomination got a very favorable reaction in the east."

Mr. Mott said he planned to spend two weeks at Breitenbush before going to work in his office here.
