

Closer Credit Control Urged

Creditmen Advised, Watch Accounts Day to Day, Sprague Talk

Closer control of credit, both on the part of the individual buyer and on the part of the seller, was urged by C. A. Sprague, editor of The Statesman, in a speech before the Salem Credit association at the Argo hotel yesterday noon.

Talking on "Avoiding the Next Depression," Mr. Sprague said that credit policies need to be adapted to the type of credit extended. He pointed to the need to watch day to day credits closely on the rule that "it is hard to get people to pay for the ash pile after they have burned up the fuel."

Touching upon the clash of ideas as to cause of the last depression, he said that in his opinion the causes were various, including dislocations caused by the war and of prices as result of abnormal demands of war time, dislocation in distribution of goods and growth of economic nationalism, over-speculation and too great use of credit.

Stimulate Production. There is too much talk of economic security, the speaker said, and instead urged that security will take care of itself if there is stimulation of production and the wide distribution of wealth. The main idea in keeping an economy and enterprise in business, he feels.

Mr. Sprague believes that not for another 40 years will a depression of the magnitude of the recent one strike the country and that under normal conditions the next depression will be "just a slight nervous chill compared to the last one."

Seidenberg Files Hop Case Appeal

Otto Seidenberg, Inc., loser in suit brought in circuit court here against Henry Tauffest and others to recover \$6500 advanced to Tauffest on a hop contract on which the plaintiff later refused delivery, yesterday appealed the case to the supreme court.

In the trial before Judge Lewelling here, the court held that the hops raised by Tauffest and profited to the Seidenberg company in fulfillment of the contract, met the quality agreed to in the contract. Seidenberg, in refusing the hops, and asking for return of the \$6500 advanced the grower, held the hops did not meet the contract quality.

Home Town Gives Knox Big Welcome

MANCHESTER, N. H., June 26.—(AP)—Col. Frank Knox, Republican vice-presidential nominee, received a tumultuous greeting from old neighbors and friends of his former home-town tonight as he pledged himself to a government program typified by New England itself.

In a speech that was addressed primarily to the people of New England he outlined a six-point program of governmental policies: economy in public expenditures, a balanced budget, maintenance of a "sound, stable currency, protection of the national credit by fulfillment of every promise uttered, preservation of local self government and maintenance of the full integrity of the judicial authority."

South Not Done With Rule Fight

PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—(AP)—Southern opponents of two-thirds rule repeal said today that their fight to retain this century-old requirement for a presidential candidate to obtain two-thirds of the convention votes was "not over by any means."

They asserted abrogation of this requirement as last night's session of the national convention applied only to the current gathering and if the national committee failed to work out a satisfactory delegate reapportionment plan in the interim, it might be revived in 1940.

The committee was instructed by the convention to formulate a new plan of apportionment based on "democratic strength" in the various states rather than on total population as at present. The next convention would pass on its recommendations.

Oregon Delegates Scolded, Bennett

PORTLAND, Ore., June 26.—(AP)—William S. Bennett, New York attorney who polled 77,000 votes for the republican nomination for the presidency in the Oregon primaries, in a letter to the Oregonian today said the Oregon delegation's failure to place his name in nomination at Cleveland could not be "successfully defended."

Bennett referred to the delegation as "Ten timorous men, who dare not keep a promise for fear that someone would say 'boo'."

The Oregon delegation failed to nominate Bennett when Colonel Knox apparently was assured of second place on the ticket.

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Growers Request 500 More Pickers

Employment Office Issues Plea For Jobs Since WPA Shut Down

There were still 500 cherry pickers needed yesterday according to the records of the Salem employment office. John Cooter, state farm employment director was here all day yesterday checking over the records and getting prepared for the anticipated rush of applicants for the jobs which were expected to come in with the partial suspension of WPA yesterday.

There is a demand for many berry pickers and there are innumerable woodcutting jobs open. Cooter said. Trucks and cars will be at the office at 7 o'clock this morning to haul the pickers to work.

Cooter requested that all persons who have jobs open list them with the employment bureau. He pointed out that many complaints had been made that help could not be secured because of WPA.

"Now that WPA is shutting down to take care of the private work, we must have the jobs to give these people," Cooter said.

He asked that any kind of farm work, house help or other jobs be listed with the bureau. The phone number at the employment office is 3754.

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Secret Agreement Made With Germans by China, Japanese Reports Declare

TOKYO, June 27.—(Saturday)—(AP)—The Domei (Japanese) News agency, in a dispatch from Shanghai, said today a secret agreement was being negotiated by which German interests would supply arms, munitions and machinery to China.

The German products, the agency's dispatch said, would be worth 100,000,000 Chinese dollars (about \$20,000,000). In exchange, it was stated, Germany would buy Chinese products.

The plan was signed at Berlin, Domei's account said.

Garner Arrives, Accepts New Bid

PHILADELPHIA, June 26.—(AP)—John Nance Garner, vice-president of the United States—who would rather go fishing in Texas than attend political conventions—came to town tonight to accept renomination at a huge rally at Franklin field.

Smiling and chuckling, his ruddy face and sparkling blue eyes in sharp contrast to his white suit, his bushy white eyebrows and his unruly white hair, the vice-president shook hands and chatted of inconsequential with a long stream of democrats but remained silent on any political question.

With characteristic abruptness he let it be known he was not going to the convention, either tonight or tomorrow, but was going to bed as quickly as the stream of visitors dwindled.

Germany Rumored Fortifying Isle

COPENHAGEN, June 26.—(AP)—A usually informed source declared tonight refortification of the Helgoland, a German island in the North Sea near which one of the major naval battles of the World war was fought, had begun.

Fortifications by big guns have been built into the rock on the west coast, this source stated, and the east coast is armed with anti-aircraft guns.

Rumors that Germany was re-fortifying the small island, which covers only a little over one-fifth of a square mile, cropped up in London June 17. Informed persons said at that time officials lacked confirmation of the rumors.
