

Santiam Spree to Celebrate New Stayton City Hall

Governor and McNary Speak

Regal Pageantry Enters Fete With Crowning of Queen Santiam

STAYTON, June 27.—Stayton will celebrate the completion of the new town hall on June 14-15 when residents of North Santiam communities gather here for the Santiam Spree. Senator Charles L. McNary and Governor Charles H. McNary will be the main speakers at the dedication of the new building.

Tuesday and Wednesday, July 14 and 15, will be merely warm-up days, with the big show to follow on Friday and Saturday. As outlined yesterday, the complete program calls for the Browning amusement company show throughout the week, it being the sole feature of the Spree on the first two days.

On Thursday, July 16, will come the official ball for Queen Santiam, who is being chosen now from among local beauties put up by Turber, Stayton, McHama-Lyons, Gates, Aumsville and other towns.

On Friday, July 17, will come the industrial parade at 11 a. m., with bands, marching units, and floats entered by business houses of Stayton, as well as other organizations.

At noon participants in the Spree will picnic free of charge in the Masonic park at Stayton, turning out at 2 p. m. to watch the pageantry surrounding the official coronation of Queen Santiam, followed at 4:30 by a complete spectacle of her majesty's court, when the whiskey judging contest is held.

For those whose tastes do not run to the regal festivities surrounding the coronation of Queen Santiam, a baseball game and sports program will be held on the local ball diamond. The Browning carnival will supply evening interest for Spree guests.

Saturday events will include a kiddies' pet parade at 11 a. m., followed by picnicking in the Masonic park.

At 1:30 p. m. will come the culminating feature of the Spree, when the new city hall is dedicated. Speakers will include Senator McNary, Governor Martin, Secretary of State Earl W. Snell, E. J. Griffith, state WPA administrator, and Mayor George A. Smith of Stayton.

Water fights at 3:30 p. m. and a log rolling contest for local woodsmen at 4 p. m. will end the celebration.

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Monmouth I.O.O.F. Loses Lodge Hall

Note for \$10,000 Signed in 1926 Foreclosed on Fraternal Group

MONMOUTH, June 26.—Normal lodge of Odd Fellows will be hosts Tuesday night to other lodges of Polk county at a special meeting. Roy H. Gibbs of Gresham, grand master of Odd Fellows of Oregon, will be chief speaker.

This will be the final meeting of Odd Fellows in the building erected by the local lodge membership some 15 years ago, and used since as the Odd Fellow, Rebekah, Grange and Circle fraternity homes.

The building erected at a time when labor and material prices were excessive, cost about \$25,000, including land. To start the work program a group of approximately 40 stockholders, Odd Fellows and Rebekahs, contributed varying individual amounts from \$50 to \$300. A mortgage of \$10,000 was necessary to completely finance construction, the money being borrowed from W. S. Hall of Monmouth.

Hit by Depression Before the depression occurred, the Odd Fellows handled the indebtedness without difficulty, renting the upper floors to the several fraternities and the lower floors to merchants. Since Miller's Store leasing about two-thirds of the lower floor space, went out of business, increasing disability to meet interest, taxes and payments was encountered.

While the Odd Fellows have actually paid off around \$14,000 in cash on their indebtedness, besides interest totalling about \$10,000, the mortgage has been foreclosed and the hall and its contents are new owners of the building.

Due to an inability to reach satisfactory rental terms with the hall heirs, the several fraternities will immediately move their equipment to the odd lodge quarters in the Monmouth Improvement company building on the corner of Main and Warren.

The first floor of the Odd Fellow building is now rented to J. C. Cady and George Cooper, local merchants.
