

President Assails "Economic Royalists" in Acceptance Address

Keeps Speech Terms General

Urges Faith, Democracy, and Charity; Slaps "Overprivileged"

PHILADELPHIA, June 27.—(AP)—President Roosevelt tonight accepted the renomination of the democratic party and opened his campaign for reelection with a scathing assault upon "economic royalists" who, he charged, fear a loss of their power through the new deal.

"The economic royalists complain that we seek to overthrow the institutions of America," he told a great throng at Franklin field.

"What they really complain of is that we seek to take away their power. Our allegiance to American institutions requires the overthrow of this kind of power."

"In vain they seek to hide behind the flag and the constitution. In their blindness they forget what the flag and the constitution stand for. Now as always, the flag and the constitution stand for a democracy, not tyranny; for freedom, not subjection; and against a dictatorship by mob rule and the overprivileged alike."

Contrasts Objectives
Mr. Roosevelt's brief address was confined to a general discussion of the issue of economic oppression as contrasted with new deal objectives of guarding the people against insecurity, "protection of the family and home, the establishment of a democracy of opportunity and aid to those overtaken" by disaster.

"But the resolute enemy within our gates is ever ready to beat down our words unless in greater courage we will fight for them," he said. "For more than three years we have fought for them. This convention in every word and deed has pledged that that fight will go on."

"We do not see faith, hope and charity as unattainable ideals, but we use them as stout supports of a nation fighting the fight for freedom in a modern civilization."

"Faith—in the soundness of democracy in the midst of dictatorships."

"Hope—Renewed because we know so well the progress we have made."

"Charity—in the true spirit of that grand old word."

After thanking the party and people for "sympathy, help and confidence" in the three years of the new deal, asserting that fear has been "conquered," Mr. Roosevelt added that he could not, with candor, report that "all is well" with the world.

Sees New Difficulties

"Clouds of suspicion, tides of ill-will and intolerance gather darkly in many places," he said.

"In our own land we enjoy indeed a fullness of life greater than that of most nations. But the rush of modern civilization itself has raised for us new difficulties, new problems which must be solved if we are to preserve to the United States the political and economic freedom for which Washington and Jefferson planned and fought."

Political tyranny was "wiped out" in the revolutionary war, but since that struggle, he added, "men's inventive genius released new forces in our land which reordered the lives of our people."

Border Patrols Enlarged, Syria

BEIRUT, Syria, June 27.—(AP)—Border patrols were reinforced tonight following a report trans-Jordan Arab tribes had sent a nationalist ultimatum to Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchop, Palestine high commissioner.

The nature of the ultimatum was not disclosed, but in view of mounting Arab nationalist feeling in sympathy with the Palestine Arabs' fight against the Jewish influx in the holy land, French and British forces took added precautions on their respective sides of the border.

Meanwhile Syrians voluntarily cut off shipments of goods to Palestine Jews in an effort to help the Arabs in their fight against Jewish immigration and land ownership.

Myrna Loy Weds Arthur Hornblow

HOLLYWOOD Calif., June 27.—(AP)—The titan haired Myrna Loy, whom the late Rudolph Valentino converted from a sculptress to a movie vamp, became Mrs. Arthur Hornblow, Jr., today.

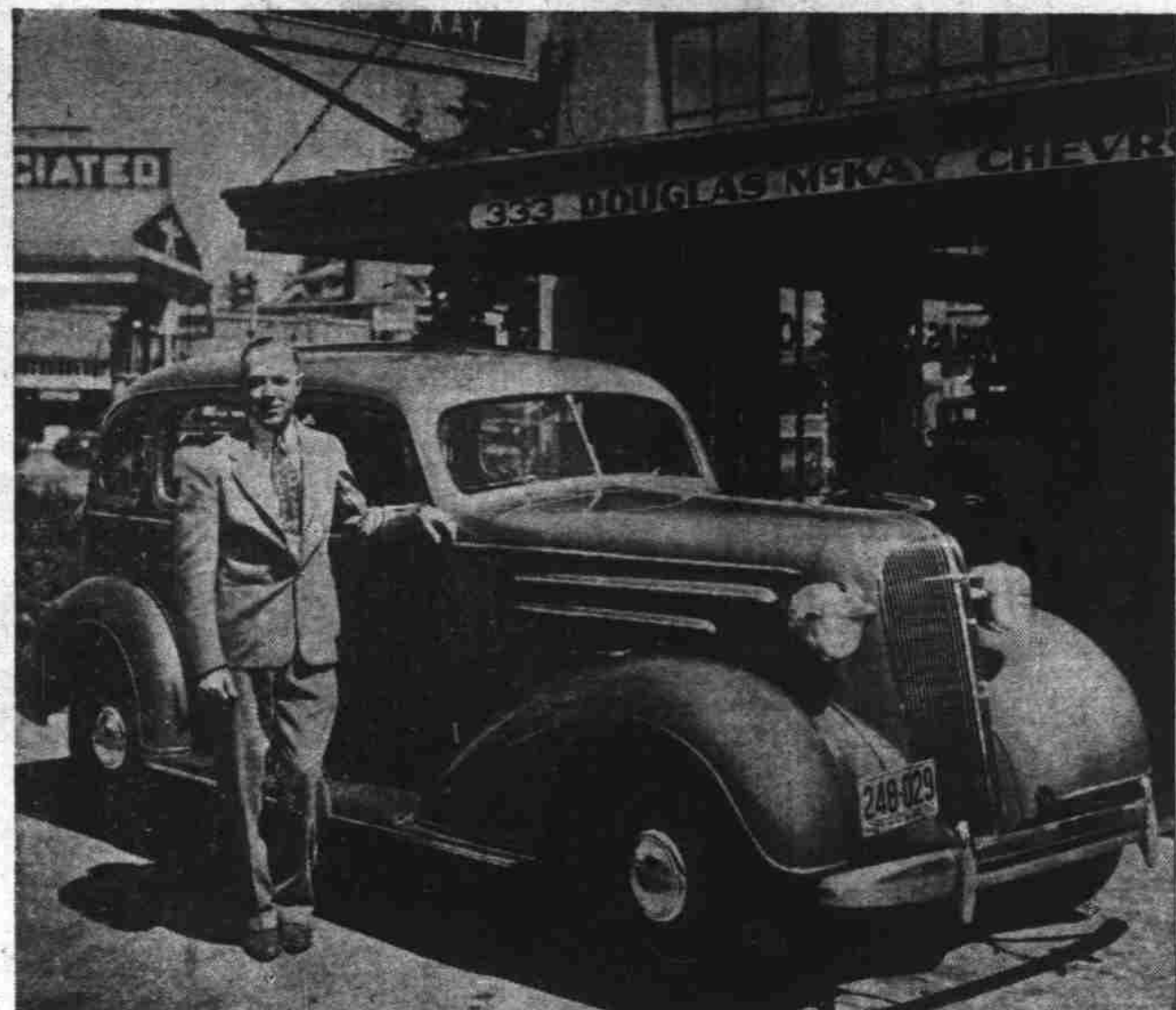

Germany, China Talk Trade Pact

NANKING, June 28.—(Sunday)—Special German representatives reported negotiating a proposed trade pact between Germany and China, and national government authorities were uncommunicative today.

It is thought the pact will be a "barter agreement" for the exchange of goods with the understanding Germany will ship desired manufactured articles to China over a period of five years and that China will be allowed 15 years to pay.

It is expected a joint commission of the two governments will be established in Shanghai to supervise the execution of the pact when it is concluded. It was said in informed sources the agreement probably would be finished within two weeks.

Neither the German embassy nor the national government foreign offices is participating in the conversations, which are believed to concern more than the peacetime development of materials.

Big Family Plan Begun in Russia

MOSCOW, June 27.—(AP)—A big family project, which taxes divorcees and grants state aid to families with numerous children, became law tonight on approval by the all-union federal executive committee.

The law prohibits operations for the prevention of childbirth, establishes graduated taxes from 50 to 300 rubles (\$10 to \$60) for divorcees, and provides for government financial help to families with more than six children.

Doctors performing illegal operations will be punished by imprisonment. Men who induce women to undergo such operations will be liable for two years in prison. The women will be publicly rebuked.

Dempsey Declares Bomber Finished

COLUMBUS, Ga., June 27.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight boxing champion, said tonight he believed Joe Louis, knocked out recently by Max Schmeling, is through as a first rate fighter.

"Joe's glory jaw will be a target for every fighter he meets in the future," said Dempsey, here to referee a wrestling match. Dempsey also eliminated Max Baer as a future heavyweight threat.

He said Jack Sharkey, former champion, attempting a comeback, is still a good boxer but predicted he will not go far again.

Columbia Basin's Development Slow

WALLA WALLA, June 27.—(AP)—Fifteen to 20 years will elapse before any substantial farm production can come from the Columbia basin irrigation project, E. E. Stoutemeyer, district counsel for the bureau of reclamation, Washington, D. C., told the western regional conference of the American Farm Bureau Federation here today.

It will add, conservatively, 50 per cent to Washington's population when in full production, he prophesied.

Nicaragua Quits League, Geneva
GENEVA, June 27.—(AP)—Nazi Germany and Nazi problems in the strategic little free territory of Danzig stirred the anxiety of league of nations powers today.

As for sanctions against Italy—there were predictions that assembly debate on the question of lifting them would be only a formality next week because so many countries have indicated they do not want to go on with the measures.

Germany's rearmament informed sources said, was discussed at a conference between Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden of Great Britain and Maxim Litvinov, Soviet Russia's foreign commissar.

Nicaragua joined the Latin American states which have resigned from the league today, giving rise to suggestions of possible ambitions for a Pan-American league of nations among Central and South American powers. Guatemala, Paraguay, Costa Rica and Brazil already are outside the league and it was reported Honduras might quit.

Illness Strikes Quezon Suddenly

MANILA, June 28.—(Sunday)—(AP)—Sudden illness today overtook Manuel Quezon, ex-president of the Philippine commonwealth.

Physicians diagnosed his case as angina pectoris. Fear also was expressed that he might develop complications because of a lung infection for which he went to the United States for a long period of treatment several years ago.

The doctors said his throat was in bad condition. He had a cough and a fever.

The illness prevented Quezon from participating in the corner stone laying of a provincial building at Cebu and he turned back toward Manila at once.

Garner Stays Up Late to Accept

FRANKLIN FITLD, Philadelphia, June 27.—(AP)—John N. Garner of Uvalde, Texas stayed up an hour or so past his usual bedtime tonight to accept renomination for the vice-presidency of the United States.

And then—after a brief moment in the spotlight before the cheering thousands who packed this famous football field to see and hear President Roosevelt and

the vice-president—he quietly slipped away to his train to sleep through the night on his way back to Washington.

Standing before a multitude who yipped and yelled for their "Cactus Jack" the usually silent Texan made a short but stirring address pledging anew his allegiance to Franklin D. Roosevelt and sounding a clarion call in support of the new deal.

"Franklin Delano Roosevelt is my leader my commander-in-chief" the vice-president declared. "I am a soldier and my duty is to follow where the commander leads. I accept the rules of war as laid down in the platform."

Evergreen Group Disputes Posts

PHILADELPHIA, June 27.—(AP)—Chairman James A. Farley of the democratic national committee appointed a sub-committee tonight to decide a contest between Washington state's rival candidates for national committeeman and committeewoman.

The surprise action caused E. A. Carroll of Wenatchee, a committeeman, and Roy Miesner, Seattle, vice chairman of the Washington delegation to assail Brooks Hays of Arkansas, chairman of the sub-committee.

"This is an outrage," Carroll shouted at Hays in the committee meeting room immediately after adjournment. "After I have traveled 3000 miles I am told to submit briefs. I can't conceive of such a thing."

Joseph Drumheller, Spokane and Mrs. Elsie Gardner Pickering, Toppensish, appointed to places on the national committee by the state committee, and Mrs. Elise Baumgart, Seattle, and Carroll, elected by the state convention, appeared before the meeting expecting an immediate decision.
