Senators' Hands Full
Without worrying about the outcome of other clashes, however, the Senators will have enough to do to keep the youthful Woodburn team from wrapping them up and marking the package "Do not open until Christmas." A win over Salem would mean almost as much to the Babes as a pennant and their hustling, hitting ball club will be on its toes.

Ron Gemmell is slated to pitch for Woodburn. Gemmell had had luck in his first game, against Hop Gold, but held the slugger Toledo Lions to a few hits last week.

Don Burch, other Woodburn hurler, is reported to have quit the Woodburn team to play with the Silver Falls Timber club.

Locals Showing Form
Although Salem had trouble bunting its hits where they counted in early games the Senators staged a three hit rally last week at Bend that won them the game 3 to 1. Vinnie Harriman and Dwight Aden have been doing most of the heavy bludgeoning for the Senators.

Woodburn's snappy young club made other state league teams sit up and take notice when it pounded a 20 to 7 win over Albany two weeks ago. The Babes were defeated 3 to 1 by the veteran Toledo club last Sunday.

Bartenders Derby On Legion's Bill

Ends Sports Program at Fairgrounds on 4th; Races Announced

Training in a very important art may be necessary for entrants in the Bartenders' derby; feature event of the morning sports program which Oliver B. Huston is arranging for the July 4 celebration at the fairgrounds sponsored by the American Legion.

The derby, appropriately open to Legionnaires only, will be the windup of a program of 20 races mostly for children.

Entrants in the derby must run 50 feet to a bar, put on aprons, pick up serving trays, place upright thereon bottles and glasses and pick up openers. Then with all their paraphernalia they run 50 yards to tables where customers are seated, set down trays, open bottles, fill glasses, replace bottles on trays and return 50 yards to the bar.

That something must be done and done fast to save the pitchers was the main conclusion after the first week of the Salem softball season. Nearly every one of the pitchers, pitching this year from 2 1/2 feet farther back than last year, found himself victimized by hammering attack that brought the total hits in eight games to 167.

It is probable that the pitching distance will be changed back to the standard distance of 37 1/2 feet. It was changed shortly after the spring league because the pitchers were said to have too much advantage at that distance with the new inseason ball.

The reverse is now true and it may be possible to find a happy medium where pitchers and batters may both be happy.

The Man's Shop holds the hitting championship for the first week with 32 hits in two games. Twenty hits in their game with the Eagles boosted averages all around.

All teams, however, have been smacking the apple, ferociously. Henry Singer fared better than any other pitcher with only 13 hits off him in two games. Hits averaged 20.8 per game in the eight games of the first week. Last year's first week averaged 18.8 hits per game.

While the batters were making merry the fielders were looking sad. Errors came in flocks and droves, a fault due partly to the unsettled condition of the new field and to the lights which are still being adjusted. Center fielders complained of the light cluster on the grandstand glaring in their eyes and to alleviate this metal visors will be placed on the offending glims.

The eight teams managed to commit 91 boots during the first eight games for an average of 11.3 per game. This compares with an average per game of 9.1 last year.

Runs, with all the hits and errors, naturally crossed the plate with great frequency and 140 were scored in the first week as compared with 103 last season. The games averaged 17.5 runs each.
