Minto Trial Will Start on July 13

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Custer Ross and W. C. Winslow, after interposing the motion for continuance until such time as Minto's health warrants and hearing the court's decision to call in two outside doctors, declared any reputable doctors were acceptable to them.

After the motions were presented to the court, Special Prosecutor Moody pointed out that Minto was well enough to appear as a witness for Grey G. Coffey, former city police officer who was convicted of accepting a bribe in circuit court here earlier this month, and that moreover Minto, Moody understood, was well enough to engage in activities in connection with the case outside of appearing as a witness.

At this point, Defense Counsel Carson objected that jurors were in the room, and these were excused.

Heart Difficulty Is Complicated by Cold

In the affidavits from Dr. Morse and Dr. Ross, showing is made that Minto is suffering from myocarditis, dilated aorta and spastic colitis, and in addition is suffering from an acute cold at the present time. The doctors' affidavits declare he is physically unable to withstand ordeal of a trial now due to the cold and heart condition, and that trial at this time would probably result in collapse of the defendant. Dr. Morse's affidavit states that with rest and clearing up of the cold, defendant's condition will probably improve sufficiently to allow his appearance in court at a later date.

Minto's affidavit states he is innocent of the charge, that his defense requires his own testimony for refutation and that he is at the present time confined to bed under physician's orders.

Following the ruling in court yesterday for postponement of the case until July 13, Special Prosecutor Moody inquired of Attorneys Ross and Carson if they would interpose a similar motion as that filed yesterday two weeks hence.

The attorneys declared that they would certainly do so if condition of Minto's health made it necessary.

On this indictment, one of two pending against Minto, he is charged with refusing to prosecute for gambling, this being a misdemeanor under the statute. Conviction on the charge carries a fine from \$50 to \$500 and mandatory for the court to declare the office of an officer so found guilty vacant for the balance of his term.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 29.—(AP)—Tales of wagon-spoke beatings and use of the lash by drunken guards came today from a grand jury investigation of the state reform school for boys.

In its formal report, the grand jury charged Superintendent G. Newt Choate is "either incompetent or indifferent" and added he is "unfit to carry on the great humanitarian work of the office he now holds."

Picking 20 boys at random, the jurors said they found "most everyone of them had scars and lacerations" and added:

"Boy after boy testified one or more of the guards had been drunk on duty and were rather persistent in whipping them at such times."

The "most savage" of implements of punishment, the jury said, "was a large spoke out of a wagon wheel which several boys testified had been used on them."

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today in a real Iowa atmosphere. As the convention gavel resounded to call the meeting to order, hundreds of Portland school children, in a mass chorus, sang the famous Iowa corn song and followed it with the Oregon song.

Dr. Hunter, plunging without formalities into his address, "We chart our future policies," told the teachers that historians of the future will write that in those days of the 20th century "there were giants in the earth."

"At no time in history have conceptions of such import to the entire race been espoused by the millions of individuals constituting great nations or groups of nations and set in battle array, one against the other, as in the past two decades," he said.

In these two decades of tragic disillusionment, one nation after another, numbering population by the millions, for the false assurance of economic security turns in its frantic desperation of fear and dire need to the despotism of class dictatorship.

"And in America and the nations of the western European seaboard, where the democratic philosophy of life had created its real strongholds, the battle seems to be joined for final decisive termination."

Three Fundamental Ideas are Listed

If the teaching profession accepts the responsibility which the nation places upon it, three fundamental ideas must be kept before it, he said. They are:

1. The spread of knowledge has a creative rescue power for the ills of society.
2. Our American origin and the total of our life experience commits us irrevocably to the democratic philosophy of life.
3. The methods of science applied to the realm of economics confirm the conception that widespread economic prosperity is to be found in the constant increase of the levels of living and culture of the people.

Budge Earns Way Into Semi-Finals

WIMBLETON, Eng., June 29.—(AP)—Don Budge again joined the tennis titans of the world today as he administered a crushing defeat to Adrian Quist, Australian titleholder, and landed in the semi-final round of the all-England championships for the second year in succession.

Like the three other winners of penultimate brackets—Fred Perry, the defending champion, H. W. "Bunny" Austin and Baro Gottfried Von Cramm—Budge sailed through without the loss of a set, winning at 6-2, 6-4, 6-4.

Perry and Austin claimed Americans as their victims, Perry annihilating a willing but outclassed Bryan "Bitty" Grant of Atlanta, 6-4, 6-3, 6-1, and Austin making Wilmer Allison, the 31 year old American champion, look as though he at last had reached the end of the trail, Austin won 6-1, 6-4, 7-5.

Von Cramm, finalist against Perry last year, administered the same bitter medicine to the veteran Jack Crawford of Australia, triumphing at 6-1, 7-5, 6-4.

Experts looked for another Perry-Von Cram final.

EUGENE, Ore., June 29.—(AP)—Harold Briggs, Portland, flew his airplane special to an unofficial altitude record for light airplanes of 22,176 feet in one hour and 45 minutes at the second annual airmeet of the Private Flyers association here Sunday.

The mark, unofficial because Briggs carried no barograph, exceeded the official record of 19,539 feet set three years ago by Tex Rankin, another Portland aviator. Briggs plans to make another altitude flight next week, carrying a barograph.

Australia Denied Favorable Tariff

WASHINGTON, June 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today ordered Australia removed from the list of nations receiving tariff concessions.

The reason was given that the Australian government was according discriminatory treatment to American commerce.

The decision, conveyed in a letter to Secretary Morgenthau, places Australia along with Germany as the only nations on the "discriminatory" list.

The president's order is effective August 1.
