Agate Beach Bluff Is Site

Basement for Recreation Has Big Fireplace Made of Rock

WOODBURN, June 29.—Dr. Gerald B. Smith of Woodburn is having a summer home built at Agate Beach, which will be one of the most completely modern cottages at that summer resort.

The cottage will be located on a bluff overlooking the ocean and will have a large living room facing the ocean with rock fireplace at one end. A dining room, kitchen, bedroom, bath and other smaller rooms, are located on the main floor with a balcony over the upper part of the smaller rooms which opens onto the living room.

A basement is to be finished into a recreation room for the doctor's special use and contains a huge fireplace of rock. The outside of the cottage is finished with special hand cut shingles. Dr. Smith hopes to have the cottage completed by September.

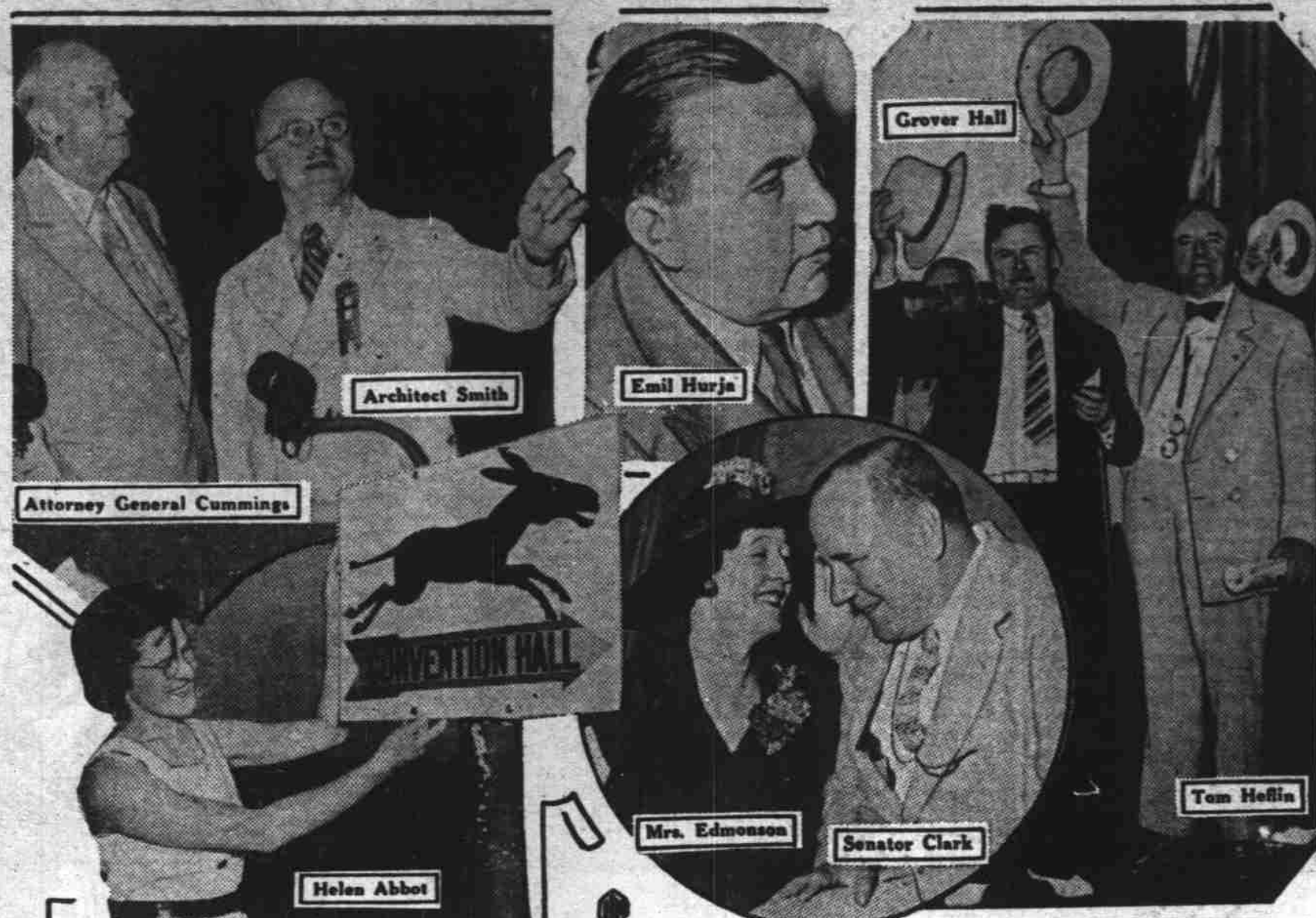

Rickreall Grange Against Proposals

Votes Down Four Changes Proposed for State Constitution

RICKREALL, June 29.—The local grange at its meeting Friday night went on record as opposing four proposed amendments sent out from the state grange to be voted upon by local granges.

The following proposed measures were voted down: first, to set state grange session up a day beginning on Monday, instead of Tuesday; second, raising the state secretary's salary from \$1500 to \$1800 per year; third, paying of delegates five cents per mile; and fourth, adding two more members to state agriculture committee, making five instead of three and dividing the state into five districts. R. W. Hogg read an explanatory article upon the grange power bill.

S. L. Stewart announced that the Polk county health association would meet in Perrydale, July 13, where two health talks would be given by prominent speakers.

Master Harland of the grange named the community fair committee chairman: textiles, Mrs. F. E. Pence; publicity, Mrs. E. A. Stenson; canned foods, Mrs. W. W. Rowlett; baked goods, Mrs. J. Ragsdale; premiums, Mrs. George Van Santen; and antiques, Mrs. Mary Adams.

The men of the grange will have charge of the agricultural division of the fair. The master spoke upon those in the community who have received money from the A.A.A. and were paid upon a 13 1/2 percent basis instead of 10-13 as previously.

Elbert Ragsdale gave a report on his trip to the 4-H summer school, having been sent from the local grange. He was rated third place in judging.

On their return they stopped at Silverton park for supper and while the meal was being spread the Persons decided to go swimming. Neither were expert swimmers and they found the water very cold.

People who witnessed the accident report that Otto called for help and at first those nearby did not think he was serious as he was in water scarcely deep enough to reach his trunks. But when he disappeared beneath the surface of the water an effort was made to save him. The fire department was called out to help.

Remains were taken to the Ekman funeral parlors.

The Persons and young Humphry were spending the summer at the Soderholm home. Walter Person had been in Oregon for just two weeks ago to look over the country.

Besides his brother here, Person is survived by his parents, two brothers and three sisters in the east.

The order was in line with an order previously issued by the interstate commerce commission involving interstate rates.

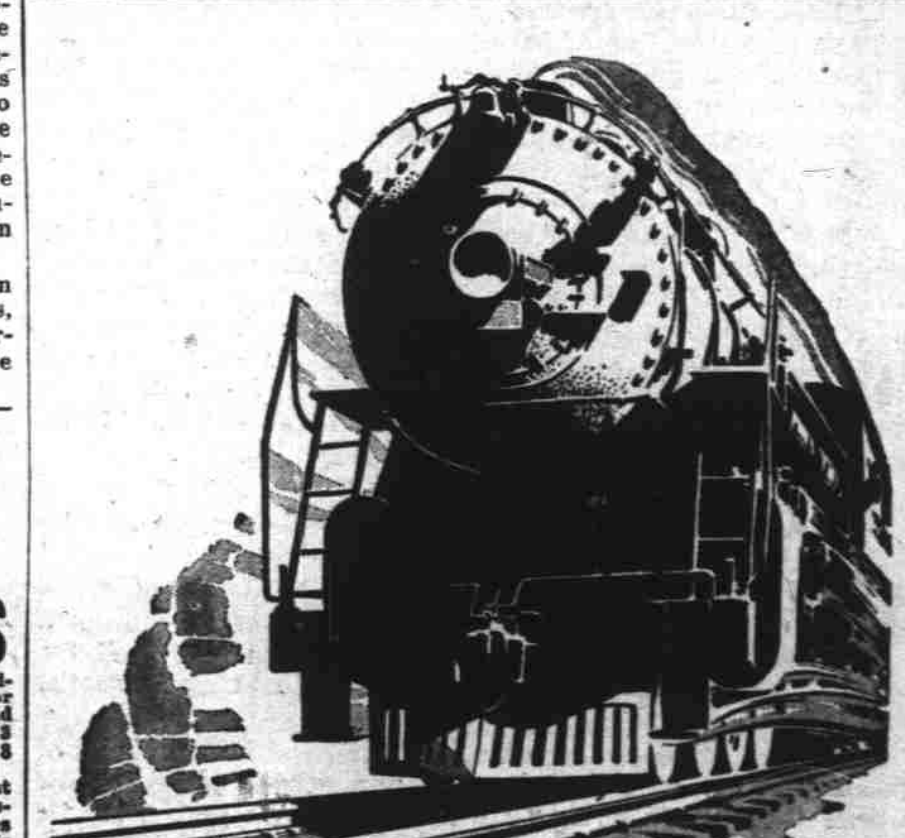
The emergency freight rates originally were authorized more than a year ago and were slightly higher than those previously in operation. The original order expires today.
