

Missionary Tells Of Oriental Trip

Miss E. Holder of Liberty Impressed by Beauties of Japanese Scenery

LIBERTY, July 1.—Friends of Miss Edna Holder, missionary to India, will be interested in the account of her journey she has written to relatives here.

Her party reached Yokohama on the S. S. General Sherman on May 20, after a delightful ocean voyage.

Points of special interest to her in Japan were the beautiful forests, lakes and waterfalls around Nikko, some of the scenes she says, were as colorful as Japanese prints. The party visited old shrines and temples in Tokyo and in Hiroshima. A Japanese church service they attended was just like one in America except the language.

Leaving from Shimoneki they arrived in Pusan, Korea. This city of 186,000 people, she was surprised to learn, holds 24 Presbyterian churches, 11 Methodist churches, some Catholic and Anglican.

Visit Christian College
Miss Holder and party visited the Christian college at Seoul, from which Chiksoon Choi, who attended Willamette university during the past year, graduated. While there they witnessed a pageant depicting the history of the school.

Stops were made in Mukden, Dairen and Tientsin. Train service is as good as in America says Miss Holder, except in China. In many cities the party got a thrill out of the shops, the embroidery displays and the many other lovely things. Miss Holder wrote that she got her greatest thrill out of seeing the Great Wall of China and also enjoyed the Altar of Heaven and the Temple of Heaven in Peking.

From Shanghai, China, the party sailed on the Ranpura June 9 to arrive in India. June 26, Miss Holder will be stationed in Puntamba, Ahmednagar, India.

Increasing thousands are solving their depression housing problems by selling their homes, buying auto trailers, and living on the road. Manufacturers of trailers are booked to capacity for six months ahead. Modern tourist camps have catered to them by providing electricity and water lines to which the trailer may be connected temporarily.
